The October meeting of the Town of Pembroke Council commenced with a request from two property owners, Mrs. Hendricks and Iris Locklear to close off an alley between their properties. The council explained to the citizens that before action could be taken, the council would have to adopt a resolution of intent to propose the closing. Then legal notice and a public hearing had to be set up on the matter. The motion to adopt the resolution was made and seconded and the public hearing will be set up for the first meeting of the Town board in November.

The ABC Board contract was taken up and the board approved of the 3% of the gross that would be realized by the contractor.

Hardy Deese requested that a master-meter be installed for his group of trailers located out near Pate's on 711. A question came up on a hook-up to the city's water and sewer supply. On approval of the council, the hook-up would be made but any repair

to any property to restore such property to its original state would have to be borne by the property holder. In other words, if the property-holder wanted to hook up to the city water line, and the line was on the opposite side of the street, the city would proceed to hook the property holder to the line; but all repairs to the street that had to be tore up or other city property would be the obligation of the property holder.

The mayor directed the city manager to write this clause into the city's policy as the city was not in the business of repairing streets and property.

The managers report reflected progress on the new well and the city has received a permit to construct the production well.

Community Development had taken care of several more homes and the project will have an amount of \$2,000 to enable another homeowner to be helped.

After the manager's report, the council went into executive session.
