

for the removal of cancer at the base of her spine, Ronda spent three months at the Durham Ronald McDonald House with her parents, Rondal and Mary Wilson.

Then for two years, Ronda and her parents traveled the long hours back and forth across the mountains while she underwent treatment for the rare form of cancer. On each trip the Wilsons stayed at the Ronald McDonald House.

"It was a Godsend and a blessing," said Rondal Wilson. Before the family discovered the Ronald McDonald in 1980, they spent large sums of money for motel rooms during their visits to Durham. The Wilsons were directed to the temporary residence by Dr. Faletta. Falletta is one of the founders of the nonprofit organization, Pediatric-Family Center of NC, Inc., which operates the House. Many members of the organization are parents who have personally experienced the emotional, physical and financial upheaval associated with a chronically ill child.
