**AGRICULTURAL EXTENSION SERVICE**

In the January 1984 issue of *Agricultural Age* there was a vivid picture and explanation of a rather extensive research project that was conducted in Wisconsin on organic production of vegetables. The study compared four crops--sweet corn, cabbage, peppers, and tomatoes--grown under organic conditions and the same crops grown under modern insect control methods. All of the plots were machine cultivated, hand weeded, or hoed for weed control. The only difference between the test plots was the organic plots received no insect control treatments, while the other plots under normal conditions were treated with insecticides.

The results showed that without the use of the insecticides, all of the vegetables except the tomatoes were damaged significantly. The sweet corn in the organic plots suffered 38 percent unfilled ears, and the yield of insect damage was 3 percent damage in the protected ears. Cabbage yields were also drastically reduced on untreated heads. The average head weight dropped from 3.5 pounds in the insect controlled plots to 1.7 pounds in the organic plots, but only 0.78 pounds of each cabbage head in the organic plots was usable compared to 3.36 pounds per head of treated cabbage.

Even though these figures are fairly dramatic, green peppers even showed more dramatic decline in yield. Even though plant size and foliage of treated and untreated peppers were nearly identical, most of the untreated plants failed to produce any peppers at all. The yield for each 10 plants dropped from 23 ounces on the regular plots to 1.5 ounces on the organic plots.

Tomatoes fared well in the study; largely because Wisconsin tomatoes are usually not subject to many insect problems, since most tomato losses in that area are attributable to fungus disease. I have shared this information to make a point about agricultural chemicals. It is a generally accepted attitude that our food supply could be drastically reduced if chemicals were not available in agriculture. Over the years insecticides that have been shown to persist in the environment have summarily been banned, while other insecticides which are very effective yet break down rapidly are now the order of the day in agriculture.

Naturally, regardless of the use that is made of farm chemicals, it is imperative for all users to know the exact rates and other characteristics of a particular chemical. This information is available in the 1984 North Carolina Agricultural Chemicals Manual, and this agricultural chemicals manual may be purchased for \$7.50 a copy at the County Extension Office. The manual is a 285-page booklet that includes information on safety, application, specimen identification, insect control, disease control, fruit disease and insect control, chemical weed control, plant growth regulators, fertilizer use, animal control, and other information about poison control centers in North Carolina.

Even though we normally distribute about 50 copies of the agricultural chemicals manual each year, I believe that with the increasing cost of farm chemicals and the numerous combinations that are now available, that it would be wise for anyone who uses agricultural chemicals to make the \$7.50 investment in the 1984 agricultural chemicals manual.

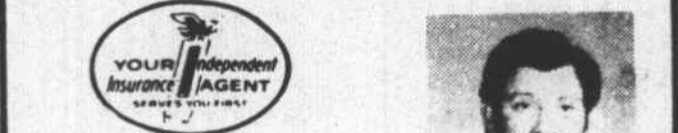
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
