Waste Treatment Plant discussed at LRBC Meeting

The proposed toxic waste treatment plant was the program topic at the monthly meeting of the Lumber River Basin Committee' on Thursday, May 24, 1984.

Mr. Larry Johnson of SCA Services. Inc. outlined his company's proposed facility which is planned for the Maxton-Laurinburg Airport Industrial park. He cited the need for such a plant in the area, its importance to the continued industrial development of the state, and the safety and environmental controls that would be imposed and followed. Dr. Barbara Wynn of Lau-

rinburg rebutted his statements and proposals. She acknowledged that although such a plant was needed, the site chosen was totally inappropriate. It lies within the flood plain of the river, is less than a mile from the river, and will emit solutions that could percolate quickly through the sandy soil. She felt that the narrow roads would also pose a hazard to the shipment of toxic materials. Dr. Wynn felt that there is a great deal of pressure from the state to locate the plant at the Maxton site. She expressed concern that the complaints and concerns of the local citizens might not be considered. Mr. Johnson stated that at

the present time he could not say exactly how big the facility would be, what materials would be handled, or what type of configuration the plant would have. All these matters depended on a marketing study now under way. He did state that the site would not handle nuclear materials and that the site would not be used as a landfill. In other business, the com-

mittee finalized its plans for the celebration of American Rivers Month. The events included a cleanup outing on the Lumber River on June 2. 1984, a photo contest with a deadline of June 7, 1984, and three canoe trips (9, 16 and 23 of June, 1984) on the Lumber River. A reception is scheduled on June 11, 1984 for the awarding of prizes in the photo contest. The reception will be held in the Robeson County Public Library.
