The 10month-old infant suffered from Biliary Atresia, a fatal liver disease where bile is not eliminated from the body properly. The Association has two goals: 1) They offer emotional and financial suppor to families needing a transplant and 2) they promote awareness.

Mrs. Brooks serves as the Director and spends her days counseling the families and making any arrangements necessary to help patients get evaluated and transplanted in a timely manner. She and her associates assist with funding, lodging, food and travel arrangements for patients and members of their family. They


