The session was held for training and informing Southern States retail personnel about new products and service programs so they can give maximum service to customers this fall.

Among the merchandising programs featured at the conference were ones on feed, seed, fertilizer, farm supplies, petroleum and more attractive salesroom displays.

Another feature of the meeting was an educational and inspirational talk by Dr. Wayne Ates, "The Minister of Mirth" from Statesboro, Georgia.

The sessions were conducted by the cooperative's commodity specialists and supplier representatives. The conference was held in conjunction with the Southern States Cavalcade '87 product show, where dealers were able to view new products and place orders for supplies for the coming months.

Raleigh-Governor Jim Martin has named H. Dobbs Oxendine Sr. of Lumberton and James F. (Buddy) Bell of Pembroke to serve on the PSU Board of Trustees. Both men will serve on the board until June 30, 1991.

Oxendine, who replaces Grady Oxendine, is the owner and operator of Wholesale Brokers in Lumberton. He attended PSU in 1949 and George Washington University of Law in 1951.

Oxendine is one of the founding members and past president of the West Lumberton Kiwanis Club. He also is an active member of the Branch Street Methodist Church.

Bell, who replaces James Hammonds, is Vice Principal of Pembroke Junior High School. He obtained a bachelor's degree in physical education and history from Pembroke State College. He is currently serving as a member of the Pembroke A.B.C. Board, the VFW American Legion and is a member of the Pembroke Kiwanis Club.

The PSU Board of Trustees advises the University administration on policy matters and adopts the rules and regulations which govern the school.

There are 13 board members; eight are named by the Board of Governors; four are appointed by the Governor; and the president of the student body serves as an ex-officio member.

OLYMPIC TORCH RUN COMES TO PEMBROKE

The Olympic Torch Run, sponsored by the Town of Pembroke and chaired by Charles Gregory Cummings, President of the Pembroke Chamber of Commerce will be coming to Pembroke July 3rd at 7 p.m. Ceremonies for the U.S. Festival Torch Run 1987 will be held at the PSU Performing Arts Center. North Carolina has been chosen for the 1987 testuval games. This includes a statewide torch run with over 8000 runners over 26 days running 2800 miles across 375 cities and towns in North Carolina. NOMINATIONS BEING ACCEPTED FOR INDUCTEES INTO PSU HALL OF FAME
