> John Allen Speaks In McLean Chair-Sponsored Program

JOHN ALLEN, director of personnel for Alpha Cellulose Corp. of Lumberton who has been such an outstanding leader in the Robeson County United Way effort, spoke recently in a PSU program sponsored by the ANGUS MCLEAN Chair of Business and Finance.

In his remarks, Allen talked about the keen competition from childhood to adulthood in Japan, which he said has risen "from the ashes" of World War II as has Korea and

Germany.
"In Japan, there is competition before is competition before is get into the first grade. There is competition to go to the best schools. The Japanese have to take tests to compete to get in the best high schools. They take tests to compete to enter the best colleges and universities. They then compete to join the best corporations.

"With the corporations, they all basically start at the same level and continue for eight to 10 years on a development tract. In this they do a multitude of different responsibilities so to get fully integrated concerning what the company's business is all about. After 10 years, the Japanese try to determine who really are the capable leaders and at that point give different responsibilities to the top individuals."

Allen said he doesn't know if this is the best system, "but it has worked very well for the Japanese culture."

TAX TIPS

Dollar Test for Head of Household

You may be head of household for filing purposes although not head of the family. For example, a son who earns more than his father and contributes more than half of the cost of maintaining the family may qualify as a head of a household. That his father, not the son, exercises family control does not matter. The important factor is a dollar testwhether the head of household for tax purposes contributed more than half the cost of maintaining the household that is his or her home and the principal home of the qualifying dependents.
