DR. STANLEY HAUERWAS OF DUKE DIVINITY SCHOOL TO BE SPEAKER FOR PSU'S STALEY LECTURE SERIES

Dr. Stanley Hauerwas, professor of theological ethics for Duke University's Divinity School, will be the speaker for this year's Pembroke State University Staley Lecture Series Monday and Tuesday, Jan. 29-30, in PSU's Educational Center Room 223.

The PSU Philosophy and Religion Department presents this annual lecture series which is funded by the Thomas Staley Foundation of Del Ray Beach, Fla. Some of the top religious scholars and lecturers in the nation have spoken in this yearly feature at PSU.

The theme of this year's lectures is "Christian Ethics in a Troubled World.'

Dr. Hauerwas will speak three times with the following schedule and topics:

Monday, Jan. 29, 9 a.m .- "What is Christian Ethics." Monday, Jan. 29, 12:30 p.m .- "Why Christian Ethics Can't Solve the World's Problems."

Tuesday, Jan. 30, 9:30 a.m.-"Reflections on Medical Ethics.'

The public is invited free to attend all of these lectures. Some of the past lecturers have been Dr. James Charlesworth, Princeton University; Dr. Walter Harrelson, Vanderbilt University; Dr. Donald Shriver, Union Seminary on New York; Dr. George Schweitzer, University of Tennessee; Dr. Dennis Campbell, Duke University; and Dr. Robert Perkins, Stetson University.

Dr. Hauerwas is an ethicist who is concerned primarily with the basic methodological issues in theological ethics. He has published on such issues as situation ethics, abortion, euthanasia and the care of the retarded and political theory.

A graduate of Yale Divinity School (B.D.) amd Yale University Graduate School (M.A., M.Phil., Ph.D.), Hauerwas did his undergraduate work at Southwestern University in Georgetown, Tex. He taught for two years at Augustana College in Rock Island, Ill., before joining the faculty Dr. Stanley Hauerwas

of the University of Notre Dame where he taught from 1970-84. He joined the faculty of Duke University in 1984 and has been appointed director of graduate studies.

He has many publications and has given testimony before the Committee on Research in Human Subjects and the Ethics Committee of the U.S. Department of Health and Welfare.

TRAGIC AUTO WRECK INVOLVING ED SMITHS STRIKES HOME AT PSU

The tragic automobile accident which occurred last Friday when Rev. and Mrs. Ed Smith of Lumberton were innocent victims of an apparently intoxicated driver who crossed the median of Interstate 95 at Lumberton and crashed into their car was felt deeply at PSU.

Rev. Smith was killed in the accident, and his wife, the former Janet Wellons, reportedly suffered a fractured neck and was taken to Duke Medical Center where she was expected to be for at least 10 days, according to reports. The driver causing the accident was also

Mrs. Smith is the daughter of Dr. Ralph D. Wellons, the first full-time president (1942-56) of what is now Pembroke State University. She and Ed Smith were married in a small, frame house which used to be the president's home along Faculty Row at Pembroke State.

The Smiths have frequently visited the PSU campus, and Janet Smith took part in PSU centennial activities in October, 1986, when portraits of all chief executives of the institution were dedicated.


