## Pembroke Kiwanis Report

The weekly meeting was held at the Town and Country Restaurant with Commissioner Noah Woods as the speaker. Program Chairman Albert Hunt presented Commissioner Woods. His subject was The Solid Waste Management Plan for Robeson County. This plan will be submitted to the North Carolina Department of Human Resources, Solid Waste Division, for their approval as mandated.

In the State of North Carolina, 75 percent of the landfills will reach their capacity within the next three to five years. To compound the problem land fill space is decreasing and solid waste is increasing. New plans call for cost effective and putting Robeson County in compliance with the State Mandate #111. This calls for the reduction of waste, the recycling that will be sold to companies that want to buy it for profit. In the last resort bury only non recyclable solid waste, engineered landfill, monitored, collecting leachate and methane gas produced. Collection is done by contract with various

companies. There are 227 waste sites in the county, including the school system and county buildings, each serviced at least twice a week. The county will need to implement six service sites collection system. Tire disposal, white goods refrigerators will be collected in an area and Cohen and Green Salvage Company will take it away. Cardboard, wood products, yard waste, plastics, glass aluminum, ferrous metals, used motor oils and lead acid batteries all will be picked up by various companies. Tremendous capital outlay will cause Robeson to adjust fees.
