went on to represent the Tar Heel State at the Presidential Inauguration in Washington, D.C., that year. She had won "Miss PSU" of 1982.

In 1986, the PSU Alumni Association honored Mrs. Loeffke with its "Outstanding Alumnus Award." Married to Gen. Bernard Loeffke and the mother of two

It will be the 10th anniversary of her winning the title herself, and she will sing as part of the evening's enter-tainment. The pageant begins at 8 p.m. As "Miss North Carolina," she developed motivational speeches and seminars for students, clubs, companies and corporations--and at the end of her reign, she was named into "The Order of the Long Leaf Pine" by Gov. ues to give these type of speeches. She recently released a recording on the Living Waters Records label entitled "Give Him a Chance." Written by her, it tells the story of a young boy she met in Lima, Peru--and gives the reason for the recording. All proceeds from the record will go to the Inter-American Children's Fund to benefit orphanages in Latin America. Mrs. Loeffke heads this international organization in Washington, D.C.

In her three years in Panama as an Army wofe, she served as advisor and spokesperson for Community volunteers, the International Red Cross, Wives' Clubs, The Crisis Line and the Army Community Service Cen-ter. She also founded the Family Symposium and the Quality of Life Council.

Mrs. Loeffke has traveled throughout Central and South America, performing and speaking. She has orga-nized fund-raisers and delivered donated items to orphan-She won the "Miss North Carolina" title in 1984 and

ages and hospitals in South America. In 1989, she was awarded the Commander's Award for Public Service from the Secretary of the Army: the highest medal given to a civilian.

She is also a marketing consultant for Telspan International, a communications corporation in Washington, D.C.

A graduate of South View High School in Fayetteville in '79, she received a four-year academic scholarship to PSU and graduated summa cum laude in '83, receiving a double Bachelor of Arts in theatre and public relations. She was also the recipient of scholarships in performance and play direction. Her honors included being named to "Who's Who Among American Colleges and Universities" and "International Youth in Achievement."

She later worked in advertising for WKFT-TV, Channel 40, in Fayetteville, and was named "Outstandi Young Woman in America" for North Carolina in 1986.

Her recording, "Give Him a Chance," includes such musical selections as "Love in Any Language," "A Little Good News," "Tu Pais," ("Your Country"-a Latin bal-lad), and "Bring Him Home" from "Les Miserables." All songs, Mrs. Loeffke says, have an uplifting theme of love of family and hope for the future.


