y. The most common allergens for kids are dust, pollen, mold, cigarette smoke and animal hair. During this time of year (and in the fall) the pollen seems to be the worst offender. Recent medical studies indicate that cigarette smoke leads to an increased number of ear infections in children and womens asthma symptoms. The most common offenders of animal hair are dog, cat and horse hair. The best way to deal with allergies is prevention and early treatment to prevent complications.
