I. The Rejection of the Servant (Isaiah 53:1-3)

Our lesson continues this week with the servant. In this lesson we see the suffering of the servant. Isaiah asks two questions here: (1) Who will believe what he has said? Certainly, this is a familiar question among believers today; because many people hear the gospel of Jesus Christ but few believe. (2) To whom is the arm of the Lord revealed? This refers to how many would truly receive the report about the servant that would suffer for mankind.

The servant would come into the world through natural birth an grow into a man. He would come out of a spiritually dead nation (Israel) who would not recognize Him as the deliverer for Israel. He came as an ordinary man; there was nothing that set him apart in His outward appearance that shows His deity.

Jesus came to a sinful world to redeem sinful man, yet He was rejected and despised by the very world He came to redeem. It is sad that a lost and dying world would not accept the Savior because He was a carpenter's son, even though many saw the mighty

earthly ministry. This was heartbreaking to the Son of God Just as Israel did not understand the plan for Jesus' suffering that mankind could be redeemed, most of the world today does not understand or car what Jesus done for them at Calvary

II. Healing Through Wounds (Isaiah 53:4-6) The servant would suffer not for

His sake but for our sake. He was smitten of God not because He deserved it, but that we could escape

The servant suffered for your sins the peace of man was born by Him Our since sick souls were made whole by the sacrifice of the servant. Salvation cam and will heal the scars of a sin sick world

Just as a lamb who is lost from the fold is helpless, without hope, with non one to protect or guide us. we suffer. Away from the protection of god, man is vulnerable to everything that the devil has to throw at us. For his reason Jesus was willing to lay down His life and bare the iniquity of all. Because He died for our sins, we can live.

III. Pleasing God Through Suffering

(Isuiah 53:10-11) In verse 10 it would seem that God would be pleased for the servant to be bruised, but He was pleased at what the results would be as a result of the suffering. As a result of the servant's sacrifice, there would come forth seed. Many will believe on the Son of God and be saved. Through dying He would live and god would honor Him for making a way for sinners to be saved.

Through Jesus' suffering God was satisfied that the sin debt requirement for mankind had been met. Because of Jesus's sacrificial death, we are justified in the sight of God. God who cannot look on sin can look on us through His son Jesus who shed His blood on calvary that we could be reconciled back to Him




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
