University of North Carolina at Pembroke Chancellor Joseph B. Oxendine confirmed today that the Mary Livemore Library was selected to house the archives of the Congressional Office of retiring U.S. Rep. Charlie Rose.

Rep. Rose made the announcement earlier today in Washington and will visit the campus Aug. 19 to participate in the ground breaking ceremony at the Livemore Library expansion project.

"Housing the archival collection from Congressman Rose gives us a jumpstart in establishing the new Sampson/Livemore Library as a magnet for scholarship and research on this campus," Oxendine said. "Congressman Rose established a distinguished record of leadership and service during his 24 years in the United States Congress."

"His papers are of important historical significance and will serve as a valuable resource for our students who wish to learn and report on the workings of the federal government. We are most appreciative to Congressman Rose for his decision to provide these materials for The University of North Carolina at Pembroke."

UNC's Mary Livemore Library's \$2.7 million expansion will add about 17,000 square feet to the existing structure. It will be renamed the Sampson/Livemore Library in honor of Oscar R. Sampson who served as the chairman of the board of trustees for 30 years and Mary Livemore who was Head of the Department of Religious Education and Dean of Women. Sampson Hall, built in 1949 and razed last year, housed the University's former administration offices. The library addition will be built on the former site of Sampson Hall and will be the library's new main entrance. The Sampson/Livemore Library will feature a great reading room and offices, thus allowing more space for stacks and classrooms in the library wing.

The architect is Pearce Donkey, Cease and Lee from Raleigh. The general contractor is

This Walker Builders, Inc. from Fayetteville. Oxendine said construction will begin next week and is slated to be completed by the end of 1997.
