The Robeson County Board of Commissioners has called a special meeting for July 17th, at 6:00 o'clock p.m. to conduct a public hearing and otherwise consider appropriation or expenditures pursuant to N.C.G.S. 158-7.1 to encourage the location of a manufacturing enterprise within Robeson County This action, if taken. will be through the use of the following economic development activi-

The acquisition and development of land for an industrial park.

In accordance with N.C.G.S. 158-7.1(d), the County will also consider the option and/or purchase of 50 or more acres of property within the County at a price not to exceed \$240,00.00 and consider the resale of this property to an industry by arriving at the amount of consideration that the County receives after taking into account prospective tax revenues to improvements to be constructed to the property, prospective sale revenues to be generated within the area as well as any other tax revenues or income coming to the County over the next 10 years as a result of the conveyance. The board will determine the probable average hourly wage to be paid to workers by the industry to be located at this property, and fair market value of the interest, subject to whatever covenants, conditions and restrictions the Board subjects the property to.

The hearing will be held on Thursday, July 17th, 1997, at 6:00 o'clock p.m. at the Robeson County Administration Building, 701 North Elm Street, Lumberton, North Carolina.



Four Named Winners of SRMC Physician Assistant Scholarships

Lumberton NC -- Thanks to Southeastern Regional Medical Center, four residents from Robeson and neighboring counties are headed to Duke University Medical Center this August to begin training as physician assistants

SRMC President J. Luckey Welsh. Jr., made the announcement at a reception on June 19 held at the Fayetteville Area Health Education Center (FAHEC) to honor the recipients: Scott Gibson. Reginald Locklear, Maribeth Schrum and Leah Wright

Gibson is a resident of Fayetteville who holds a bachelor's degree in environmental science from East Carolina university. His previous experience in health care includes work as a médical assistant and as a radiology film technician. He is currently an emergency medical assis-tant and as a radiology film technician. He is currently an emergency medical technician at Cape Fear Valley Medical Center and volunteers at the Care Clinic in Fayetteville.

A teacher at Carroll Middle School in Lumberton, Locklear currently lives in Red Springs. He received his bachelor's degree in education from UNC-Pembroke and has taught in the public schools of Robeson and Scotland counties since 1994. He has worked as a nursing assistant at the .

Lumberton Children's Clinic. Schrum lives in Racford and holds a bachelor's degree in biology from UNC-Pembroke With a background in medical technology, she is cur-

rently the hematology supervisor at the laboratory of Womack Army Medical Center

Wright: a resident of Favetteville. holds a bachelor's degree in biology from UNC-Chapel Hill Her health care experience includes work as a medical assistant in Chapel Hill and at the Tri-County Community Health Center in Newton Grove

The scholarship is a direct outgrowth of the Partnership for Community Health of Robeson County, a coalition of local groups led by SRMC to improve the health status of local citizens. One of the needs identified by the Partnership was greater access to primary health care providers such as family doctors Physician assistants are specially trained and licensed to practice medicine superised by licensed physicians

SRMC officials developed the program in cooperation with Duke and the Favetteville AHEC to recruit. educate and place physician assist tants into primary care practices in Robeson and surrounding counties. The Duke Endowment awarded funds to develop and implement this training program

According to Gloria Jordan, P.A., who coordinates the DUMC/FAHEC Clinical Physician Assistant satellite program, 21 candidates from the nine-county FAHEC region applied for admission to the Duke physician assistant program. Only five were accepted to the program and four of these received SRMC/Duke Endow-

Under terms of the scholarship all four winners will complete a 12month clinical rotation under the supervision of a FAHEC instructor after completing the 13-month program of study at DUMC Each student has agreed to return to Robeson County or another county within the FAHEC region to be employed as a physician assistant in an ambulatory, primary care practice located in a medically under served commu-

The annual scholarship award of \$15,000 is paid to DUMC and applied toward the student's tuition To date, scholarships totaling \$125,000 have been awarded to local students under this program, according to

Also honored at the reception were previous winners of the SRMC/Duke indowment scholarship Sanford Hardin and Anissa Emanuel, Hardin was the first recipient of the scholarship] and received his master's degree from Duke in May He will complete his final clinical rotations this summer and plans to work in one of the five clinics affiliated with

SRMC throughout Robeson County Emanuel has completed the first year of her physician assistant train ing program at Duke. She will begin the clinical part of her training in September Her first rotation will place her at the South Robeson Medical Clinic in Fairmont under the supervision of Dr. Dennis Stuart


