I displayed a number of wood flutes made of red cedar, western cedar, pine, walnut, and cherry. Several youths participated in flute lessons, learning to play amazing grace. It was a real thrill to see these young people genuinely in-terested in learning how to play the flute, as did our ancestors hun-dreds of years ago Jan Parker displayed several

uniquely designed ribbon shirts of which she Gifted ont to Senior Elder Spotted Turtle. (Mr. Pete).

Other traders displayed dream catchers: handmade steel knives turtle-shell medicine pouches, furs. and much more.

Throughout Saturday and Sunday, there was drumming and sing-ing by our local youth. Organized for only two months, these young men have already performed in their first Pow Wow. Their name is "Red Snake" and their mentor is

none other than Reggie Brewer.

Reggie has done an outstanding job in forming this new drum team, and is to be commended for his dedication and interest shown to our youth

Ms. Lowry will direct a program created in 1992 to address the health care needs in this ninecounty region that is medically underserved HealthCare 1999 is funded by a grant from the Duke Endowment through the American Hospital Association's (AHA) national Community Care Network demonstration project. The pro-

gram is a partnership with hospitals, health departments, health care providers, government and

businesses in the region.
UNCP Chancellor Joseph B. Ovendine said Ms. Lowry is the right person for the job of leading HealthCare 1999.

We are thrilled to have Ms. Lowry as coordinator of this program, which is very important to the quality of health in this re-gion." Chancellor Oxendine said. She has the professional train; ing, the work experience and, most importantly, the personal orientaion to excel in this position.

We searched nationwide for the right person, and I am pleased that we were able to find that person in our own back vard." Dr. Oxendine said.

Ms. Lowry also served as a coordinator for the North Carolina Indian Cultural Center. She worked as acting director of SisterCare, a family violence reduction program

in central South Carolina Ms. Lowry's immediate priority for HealthCare is hosting a visit this month from the six-member Governance and Site Visit teams from the AHA's Community Care Network. The teams review the efforts, governance and effectiveness of HealthCare 1999.

Ms. Lowry will plan the 5th annual HealthCare Summit scheduled for Dec 10 at UNCP The summit brings together regional health care officials, health care experts and concerned individuals to address regional health care is-

HealthCare 1999 is also charged with the mission of addressing the status of health care in the ninecounty region consisting of Bladen. Cumberland, Harnett, Hoke Moore, Richmond, Robeson, Sampson, and Scotland counties Other goals include establishing collaborative links to improve primary health care, increasing education opportunities for health care professionals, promoting health care careers and developing health promotions for at-risk populations. thus improving the quality of life

in the region
