That goes for teachers too who, after all, have to stay a few days after school is out in the spring and have to report a few days before school starts or, should I say, late summer. It can result in being banned from riding the bus which is a privilege - not a right.

While many of you may not have a child in school, you are affected by the opening of school if you drive a vehicle and must acknowledge the presence of school buses on the streets and highways. They require constant attention because of the frequent stops they must make to pick up and drop off children. The law requires that you stop when you come upon a bus loading or unloading children regardless of which direction its going in. To do otherwise could have disastrous results. Don't forget, too, children waiting at the roadside for




