Brayboy-Fair promoted to U.S. Public Health Service Captain

Atlanta, GA-Effective October 1, 2003, Annie Brayboy Fair was promoted to the rank of Captain (06) in the United States Public Health Services (USPHS). Capt. Fair currently serves in the U.S. Department of health and Human Services. Office on Women's Health, in Atlanta.

A promotion ceremony was held July 1, 2003 in Atlanta at the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). The ceremony was led by Read Admiral J Jarrett Clinton who serves as regional health administrator and assistant surgeon general. Dr. Clinton, who oversees health and wellness for the eight southeastern states, provided introductory comments and administered the statement of the oath of office to the promoted personnel.

"Capt. Fair has demonstrated exceptional skills and energy," said Clinton,. "I'm very very pleased for her promotion to this senior offi-cer level."

Capt. Fair, a member of the Lumbee Indian Community in Pembroke, North Carolina, was commissioned December 1, 1986 after receiving two master's degrees (Master of Public health and Masters of Social Work) from the University of North Carolina in Chapel Hill. She began her career with the Indian Health Services while stationed with the Gila River Indian Community and the Phoenix Indian Medical Center in Arizona, respectively.

Serving in her role as the regional women's health coordinator for Region IV, which includes the eight Southeastern states (Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Mississippi, North Carolina, South Carolina and Tennessee), Capt. Fair serves in a vital leadership role geared to advancing the health status of women across the lifespan. She travels extensively throughout the southeast and to Washington, D.C. to promote women's health activities and initiatives. Specifically, she works with the states to increase awareness of women's health and assist communities in developing strategies to address health issues such as diabetes, health disease, HIV/AIDS and


domestic violence.
"I am truly committed to my career in the U.S> Public Health Service and I am honored to receive this promotion," said Fair, who earned her undergraduate degree in psychology from UNC Pembroke. 
