UNITED STATES COURT DISPOSES OF APPEALS

JUDGE BOYD DECIDES IN APPEAL CASES—BRIDE GETS WEDDING PRESENTS RESTORED.

In the United States District Court yesterday Judge Boyd adjudged G. C. Strickland & Co., merchants of Salisbury, bankrupt on their own petition. The firm consists of G. C. Strickland and W. A. Daniel. The assets are placed at \$3,000, less exemptions, with liabilities of \$3,800. R. Lee Winter represented the bankrupt. The matter was referred to James Moorah, referee in bankruptcy, at Salisbury.

Judge Boyd also granted an appeal in the case of the Greensboro Cement and Plaster Co., from an order made by referee Winter in the case of the S. S. Oakes Co., bankrupts, the order appealed from adjudging that the cement company was not entitled to certain machinery then in the hands of the bankrupts.

The judge also made an order in the case of a bride whose husband had been adjudged bankrupt and whose wedding presents had been attached by the creditors. The court ordered that the property be restored to the woman.

Judge Boyd also signed an order granting an appeal to the trustees of the Fisher estate from a decree rendered in the suit of the Guardian Trust Company against the Greensboro Water Supply Company, allowing a fee to John N. Staples for services as attorney. A bill of exceptions was also signed by the judge, and bond of applicants fixed at \$4,000.

UNITED STATES MARSHAL TAKES FOUR BLOCKADERS. Deputy United States Marshal T. W. Vincent has returned from Montgomery county, where he went to arrest Will McMaisters, George Simmons, Tom Dennis and John M. Leon, charged with illicit distilling. The men all gave bond for their appearance before the United States commissioner located in Montgomery county.

LOCAL PLAYER HITS MAN. Third Baseman Jackson Said to Have Struck Fields. Last night about nine o'clock an altercation took place between third baseman Jackson, of the local baseball team, and W. A. Fields, Jr. According to reports of the bystanders, Fields was sitting quietly in front of a store when Jackson approached and, without provocation, struck him a blow in the face with his fist. Fields arose to defend himself when bystanders separated the two. Friends then conducted Jackson to his home.

Squire Collins, who was a spectator of the assault, summoned Jackson to appear before him Monday morning at nine o'clock. It is reported that Fields will have a warrant issued for Jackson's arrest.

VIRGINIA RAILWAY BREAKS ALL COALING RECORDS. Norfolk, Va., July 24.—The Virginia Railway today broke all records in the quick bunkering of foreign steamers when in sixty minutes 286 tons of coal were dumped into the German steamer Alderher for use on the remainder of her voyage from New Orleans and Pensacola to West Hartlepool.

The vessel arrived off the Virginia pier here at 6 a. m., was put under the chutes at 7 a. m. and at 8 o'clock was ready to sail. Steamers usually arrive one day, take on 300 tons of coal and get away the next day.
