

VERY LITTLE DOING IN NEW YORK STOCK MARKET

Wide Variance of Prices Between Sales of Some Shares.

New York, April 4.—Some features of interest were discernible through the day's dullness in dealings in stocks, although the net changes were inconsequential. One was the extreme thinness of the market in the periods when there were any indications of animation.

The slump of the market into stagnation after it became known that the American Tobacco decision would come from Washington today gave force to the suggestion of other causes for the lack of interest in the market than the suspense of awaiting this important judicial decision.

The poor sales reports of winter wheat conditions were partly offset by the weather bureau's forecast of general rains during the coming week.

Bonds were heavy. Total sales were \$1,644,900. United States bonds were unchanged. Total sales of stocks were \$49,980 shares.
