

SHAW, NEELLEY AND THE ALDERMEN ROASTED

Medical Society of County Will Carry Grievance to Polls. Neelley Feathering Own Nest and Shaw Is Narrow-Minded—Expect Nothing From Aldermen.

Local members who attended the meeting of the Guilford County Medical Society in High Point yesterday stated last night that the meeting had been following the arrest of the Drs. DeW and in comparison with the one in High Point yesterday, when the arrest of Dr. M. F. Fox and L. N. Burleyson was discussed and resolved upon.

It was stated that a number of physicians were present and that practically everyone denounced in bitter and outspoken language, the action of City Attorney T. J. Shaw and Chief of Police C. F. Neelley in the prosecution of the last named physicians.

Asked if any resolutions were passed for the afternoon, Dr. Farrar, Vice-Secretary of the society, stated that there were not, though he furnished a copy of a resolution unanimously adopted for the public press. Dr. Farrar explained that it was the universal opinion of the members present that there was no use in asking for any relief under the present administration, so the society unanimously decided to wait and register their complaint at the polls.

Contemptuous Silence

He stated, however, that the board of aldermen were roundly rebuked by a number of speakers for their contemptuous silence in respect to the resolutions presented to them several months ago.

Among those who denounce the aldermen, Chief of Police Neelley and City Attorney T. J. Shaw were Drs. W. J. McAnally, of High Point, Dr. D. A. Stanton, of High Point, Dr. W. P. Beall, Dr. John Roy Williams, Dr. M. F. Fox and Dr. J. T. Barriss, of High Point.

Feathering Own Nest

In his remarks Dr. W. P. Beall is reported to have stated that Chief of Police Neelley had instituted prosecutions against four reputable physicians of the county without any evidence of wrong intent, and he described the object of Mr. Neelley as a desire to feather his own nest in the eyes of a certain set of

men he was trying to play to. He also reported to have declared that while he had the utmost respect for Judge Shaw, he could not help but believe that he was prejudiced against the physicians and he declared that he was so narrow-minded that he could not see things as the public generally did and steadfastly refused to listen to reasoning.

Sickening and Disgusting

In reviewing the recent proceeding in Point court here Dr. A. Stanton and Dr. J. T. Barriss, of High Point, are reported to have declared that they were sickening and disgusting to all outside doctors, and they are further reported to have denounced the local authorities in an unbecoming terms.

Numerous recommendations and suggestions were presented with a view to giving the doctors relief from the so-called malicious prosecutions, but, as stated, it was finally agreed that nothing need be expected from the present city administration.

The Resolutions

That the public generally might know that the doctors as a profession and a society resented the action of the city authorities in prosecuting its members, the following resolutions were unanimously adopted for publication in the state press:

"Whereas Two members of this society, one an ex-president, were recently arrested and brought before the Police Court of Greensboro charged with a violation of the prohibition laws of the state, upon evidence so trivial as to arouse and merit contempt and, though promptly acquitted, were subjected to the humiliation and expense of trial up to an original charge;

"Resolved That we, the Medical Society of Guilford County, indignantly protest against these unwarranted assaults upon our fellow members, and appeal to the fair-minded citizens of Guilford County to unite with us in this protest against these indignities inflicted upon our honorable profession."

TO AUTOMOBILE OWNERS

Movement on Foot to Organize a State Association.

For some time local automobilists have talked of starting a movement for a state organization of automobile owners, but not until recently has the movement taken definite shape. Yesterday J. T. F. Lemoine, acting for a number of local owners, issued a call for a meeting to be held in Greensboro May 9 and 10, and among other matters incident to forming an organization it is planned to have races at the fair grounds, a banquet and ball complimentary to visitors. Acting Secretary Lemoine has issued the following call for the meeting:

"Greensboro, N. C., April 6, 1910. To All Owners of Automobiles Who Are Residents of the State of North Carolina:

"You are hereby cordially invited to attend a meeting of the automobile owners, to be held in this city on May 9, 10, 1910, for the purpose of effecting the organization of an association of automobilists of statewide character.

"The objects of the association will be the furtherance of the interests of automobilists; the upbuilding of the roads of the state; the formulating and suggesting of legislation for the benefit of all users of the public highways, and working for such legislation as shall be for the interest of all who use vehicles of any description; the enforcement of the laws of the road; and the banding together for the mutual good of all automobile owners.

"Among other features of the meeting will be races at the Central Carolina Fair association racetrack, a banquet at which prominent speakers will be presented, and the possibility of a ball in the evening after the banquet.

"Visitors attending this meeting in their own cars will find ample room for the storage and care of their machines at the several garages in this city, one garage alone being large enough to care for 100 automobiles. On this account it will be interesting to attend the meeting with your own cars, enter them in the parade and races, and take such part as shall make the meeting one of interest and benefit to all.

"Every owner of an automobile is invited to send in any suggestion for the program which he thinks will make it more interesting, and any information regarding the meeting will be gladly furnished upon application to the undersigned.

"This invitation has been extended to you after talking with a good many of the automobile owners, dealers and others of prominence, and it is hoped that everyone will contribute his share to the success of the undertaking.

"Trusting for your kind and hearty cooperation, and that we shall have many inquiries as well as the promise of the attendance of a large number of those interested in automobiles and good roads, we cordially and confidently await your communications.

While nothing official could be learned at the local office, it was stated on good authority that the resignation had been tendered and that Mr. Walton had accepted a similar position with the Chicago and Alton, with headquarters in Bloomington, Ill.

General Superintendent Hatchels was out of town yesterday and nothing official could be learned as to who would be Mr. Walton's successor here, though the speculation among railroad men is that the place will go to Superintendent

KILLED BY CAVE-IN

Two Negroes Met Instant Death—One Has a Pistol.

Jim Rogers and DeWitt Johnson, negro men, working for the plumbing firm of Adams and Hunt, were killed instantly yesterday at a sewer ditch behind the Huntley-Stockton Hill Furniture company's store. The men killed, with another, Tom Slade, were at work in a 12-foot ditch when the piled up dirt tumbled upon them, and though rescuers worked valiantly, life was extinct when they were removed from the mass of dirt 10 minutes later. Slade was in the upper end of the ditch which is about 30 feet long, and escaped unhurt.

When taken out it was hoped they might be revived and physicians worked on them for an hour in the rear of the Huntley-Stockton Hill store, but it proved useless. The bodies were later removed to the undertaking establishment of James McNeill for burial preparations.

In a concealed pocket of Rogers' undershirt, just under the left arm, a rusty 38-caliber revolver was found, the negro having been working beneath ground with a concealed weapon hidden in a concealed pocket. It was at first reported that Sam Gorrell was among the dead, but later Sam was notified on the street, apparently unharmed and very much alive, so an investigation revealed the fact that Jim Rogers was Sam Gorrell.

Both negroes leave families and are said to have been hard workers and good providers.

The cave-in was caused by piling up dirt on the banks of the excavation, which runs parallel with a two-story building. Stobs had been driven near the bank to hold back the dirt, thereby loosening the bank and making it powerless to withhold the heavy pile of loose dirt. The work was described by men familiar with such jobs as exceedingly careless.
