Winston-Salem, April 20.—The brotherhood of the First Presbyterian church decided last night to establish a medical dispensary at some point in China at a cost of about \$1,200 as a memorial to the late J. Worth McAllister. The memorial will be known as the "John Worth McAllister Memorial," and the meeting voted unanimously to ask the board of missions for permission to take this action.

The brotherhood has already pledged \$1,010 for the cause of missions this year and the balance necessary to erect the dispensary can be easily raised. The church has subscribed a total of \$3,335 for missions this year. DISMISSED COMPLAINTS AND TAXED PLAINTIFFS WITH COSTS. (Special to Daily News.) Asheville, April 20.—Judge Boyd, of the United States Circuit and District courts, yesterday at Statesville granted a final decree in the suit of the North Carolina Mining company against the Westfields and others, dismissing the bill of complaint from the United States courts and taxing the plaintiffs with the costs, amounting to about \$8,000. The United States Circuit Court of Appeals had previously taxed the plaintiffs with more than \$4,000, making the total cost of this litigation in the Federal courts more than \$12,000.

Died From Poinaine Poisoning. (Special to Daily News.) Durham, April 20.—Miss Beanie Dickerson died today as the result of poinaine poisoning which she received last week from eating canned kraut. The poison developed slowly and there appeared no occasion for alarm. Saturday of the past week she began to feel worse and from Sunday there was but little hope. She died about 10 o'clock this morning, after an agonizing experience. The doctors have not made up their certificate yet, and the account of the death is given by friends. Mrs. Dickerson was 25 years of age and leaves three small children, one less than three months old. She was the daughter of P. T. Broadwell, a herryman of this city.

Shook principal incorporator; the Farmers' Banking and Trust company, Tarboro, with \$100,000 capital, receives a charter with G. A. Heidernes, C. A. Johnson and others incorporators, for a general banking and trust business.
