

### PETITION CONGRESS TO STOP DISCRIMINATIONS

Directors of Chamber of Commerce Ask Congress to Eliminate From Present Law the Words Which Allow Discrimination in North Carolina Territory.

At a special meeting of the directors of the chamber of commerce yesterday afternoon, every director being present, resolutions regarding the elimination from the present national railroad law the words that allow freight discriminations against North Carolina territory were offered and unanimously adopted. It is thought that the question to which the resolutions have reference will be voted on in Congress within the next two weeks, and the Greensboro organization urges prompt cooperation of all North Carolina cities in the support of the movement to secure an amendment to the present system of laws.

A copy of the resolutions, which are given below, will be mailed each North Carolina representative in Congress, also to each organization representing the principal cities of the state, with a request that each body take similar action toward effecting the present situation and alleged unjust discriminations. The resolutions as proposed and adopted are as follows:

Whereas, Congress is now considering bills to amend the interstate commerce act of February 4, 1887, and

Whereas, there is a strong sentiment in the Senate and the House of Representatives in favor of changing the law as to prevent discriminatory and exorbitant rates in favor of certain communities and points known as gate cities and other territories in the northern portion of the United States, and

Whereas, all North Carolina territory is suffering on account of discriminatory rates and some of the proposed amendments now being considered by Congress promise relief against the unjust conditions that are now maintained by the railroads, and

Whereas, points known as gate cities are active in bringing resolutions to bear upon members of the Senate and House of Representatives to continue the present law in effect and allow the present conditions to be maintained, and

Whereas, the various amendments now pending before Congress with reference to these matters will probably

be voted on within a very short time, therefore,

Resolved, That it is important to the commercial, manufacturing, agricultural and other interests of the state of North Carolina that the present conditions with respect to discriminatory freight rates by the railroads serving North Carolina territories be changed.

Resolved, further, That our Senators and Representatives in Congress are hereby urged to support effective amendments, making it unlawful for railroad companies to charge more for freight on a short distance than is charged by railroad companies for a long distance, where the long haul includes the short.

Resolved, further, That our Senators and Representatives in Congress be requested to support amendments to the present law which will provide for all points to which shipments are made through gate cities, and which rates shall be based upon the theory that the rates to the gate cities are just and the excessive rates for the additional distance shall be only a fair rate per mile for the entire distance, and that the rate per ton per mile should increase as the distance increases.

Resolved, further, That in our opinion the present scheme of freight making whereby certain points which are preferred by the railroads are given a rate to territory which is not by statute tributary to these points, and which they could not reach except by reason of the present unjust scheme, which is wholly inequitable and indefensible and the result of it is to place in the way of the growth of all North Carolina territory an unremovable obstacle.

Resolved, further, That in our opinion that if the people of North Carolina understand the remedies available to them by the proper action of Congress, they would be so insistent that relief be granted that their attitude would go far toward correcting present abuses.

Resolved, further, That we invite the cooperation of other cities and communities in the state in this matter and suggest a joint meeting of the people at some central point, or at least, the immediate passage of some such resolutions as these by the various commercial bodies of the state.

### WOMAN A BLACKMAILER

And She Confined Her Operations Solely to Ministers.

United States Deputy Marshal Thomas W. Vincent has returned from Randolph county, where, on Tuesday night he arrested Daisy Caudle, a pretty young white woman, on a warrant charging the use of the United States mails in a scheme for the purpose of defrauding and blackmailing. The Caudle woman is said to have confined her operations solely to ministers and it was through the assistance of Rev. J. T. Milloway, pastor of Burkhead M. P. church at Winston, that Postoffice Inspector C. H. B. Leonard secured his first working strings. The Caudle woman is alleged to have mailed letters to ministers in Winston, Liberty, Mayodan, High Point, Ashboro and numbers of other places, in which she threatened to report them to the conference on charges of improper relations with her provided a letter was not received by the next mail with a \$10 bill enclosed. Whether she got any tens or not is unknown, but it is certain that she tackled the wrong man when she tackled Rev. Milloway.

The woman is said to be about 24 years old, pretty and of sound mind, though her character is said to be questionable. She lives with her parents about two miles from Randolph and it is also said that they are well to do and respectable farming people. At the time the letters were alleged to have been mailed by the woman she was working in an overall factory in High Point, but she has been at home now for more than a month.

#### OHIO VALLEY EXPOSITION AT CINCINNATI, OHIO

L. C. Powell, vice-president of the Southern railway and chairman of committee on "The South and its Resources" for the Ohio Valley exposition, has been advised by the Interstate-commerce commission regarding free transportation in both directions for the exhibits at the Ohio Valley exposition to be held in Cincinnati, O., Aug. 15 to Nov. 24, 1910. The commission advises that under section 22 of the act, carriers are authorized to grant free and reduced rate transportation of property for the United States, state or municipal government, also charitable purposes, or for exhibitions at fairs and expositions.

The Southern railway will transport free exhibits for this exposition, but will require the fact that these exhibits will be and are regularly exhibited to be certified to by the proper officials of the exposition.
