

A. & M. STUDENTS SHOW PROGRESS OF EDUCATION

OLD PIECE OF WRITING

Copy of Marriage Certificate of Guilford Couple 135 Years Ago.

A document paper writing—that is 135 years old, has been handed us by a Greensboro citizen, W. D. Mendenhall. It is the marriage agreement and certificate of ancestors of Mrs. Mendenhall, five generations work, and is in the possession of and torn then used by the people called Quakers. The document reads as follows:

Whereas, Enoch Blair, of the county of Guilford, State of North Carolina, son of Enoch and Sarah Blair, and Hannah Milkkan, daughter of William Milkkan and Jane his wife, of the county and province aforesaid, having declared their intentions of marriage with each other before several monthly meetings of the people called Quakers at Centre, in the aforesaid province, county of Guilford, and having consent of parents and relatives concerned therein,

Their proposals of marriage were allowed by the said meeting. Now these may certify all whom it may concern that for the full accomplishment of their aforesaid marriage this tenth day of the 10th month in the year of Our Lord the thousand seven hundred and seventy five, they the aforesaid Enoch Blair and Hannah Milkkan appeared at a meeting appointed for that purpose of the aforesaid meeting of John Kirk in the aforesaid county of Guilford, and solemnized their marriage according to the good order used among Friends, and as a further confirmation thereof they the aforesaid Enoch Blair and Hannah Blair, did unto these certificate set their hands, she according to the custom of marriage assuming the name of her husband.
