BOARD OF ALDERMEN

Several Matters of Local Interest Were Disposed of.

Last night's adjourned session of the board of aldermen was replete with smaller matters of local interest, the question of license, Sunday ordinance, resolution regarding repairing of the municipal building and fitting of horses on the streets being discussed and acted upon before adjournment.

The matter of license for the year beginning June 1, which was continued from last Friday night, was given first consideration, and with few alterations was unanimously adopted as recommended by the committee.

Where decided upon were Aleat market, \$25; fish and oyster dealers, \$25; or where the two combined \$50, but the license to be granted only by permission of the board.

Another important matter was fully discussed, which resulted in the taking of one more step of retreat in sliding back of the Sunday laws by the striking out of the little word "magazines" as one of Sunday prohibited articles, and allowing it to be placed on the "free list."

The fathers decided that the city hall was in sore need of repairs, that several coats of paint would greatly add to the beauty of the building, and appointed a committee to receive bids and make a contract.

In the future poolrooms, billiard rooms and the like must have no curtains, screens, colored glass or anything obstructing the view from the street, thus making these places more public and easier to be controlled by police, said the aldermen.

A letter received by the clerk from the Southern Life Trust company was read before the board, in which a complaint was made on account of damages to a barn by the city fire company, was referred to the street commission, and the board adjourned at 11 o'clock.

JUDGE EURE HAD A BIG SESSION OF MONDAY COURT. In Municipal court yesterday morning Judge Eure was greeted with an unusually large docket, even for the average Monday, the session requiring the entire morning to clean up the docket, and reminding one of the days in antiproduction times.
