"This leads," he said, "to an increase in crime and immorality and is especially noted in the illiterate lendership. There are 30,000 negro preachers who exercise an enormous influence over 9,000,000 negroes. About 10 per cent, of these have received more than a primary education and the remaining 27-time are ignorant men who are framing the deutinies of milhons of their fellows."
