

GENERAL APATHY LAYING SEIGE TO STOCK MARKET

Professional Traders Had to Depend Upon Themselves for Business.

New York, June 15.—The stock market at present possesses no distinctive feature except its apathy. In the course of the day this amounted to stagnation. The professional traders found very light offerings of stock for sale, and they argued from this a strong uncertainty and operated in consequence for an advance. Attempts to sell stocks, however, developed as thin as a reed as they were for the most part prices yielded readily to light selling pressure.

The strength of Erie was supposed to be due to the evidence of improvement in its terminal facilities. The home coming of J. Morgan was supposed also to be an influence on the stock. Reading got some benefit from yesterday's extra dividend declaration.

Central Railroad of New Jersey controlled by Reading. Announcement of a traffic agreement between the Southern Pacific and St. Louis and the Gulf ports, had a strengthening influence on the Harrison property.

A pronounced recession in foreign exchange rates was a feature of the day. Bills against the Southern Pacific bonds placed in Germany were supposed to affect the market. Some large sums were disbursed in dividends, including \$5,000,000 by the Standard Oil company, but the money market was not appreciably affected.

Bonds were irregular. Total sales par value, \$2,138,000. United States bonds were unchanged on call. Total sales of stocks for the day were 352,560 shares.

New York, June 15.—The dry goods market was quiet and steady for the day. Cotton goods appear to hold fairly firm, although in light call. Linens and hosiery are being shown for spring and were slightly better over last year, although cotton yarns are generally higher.

NEW WHEAT COMING IN CAUSED WEAKER FEELING

Premium of December Over September Considerably Widened.

Chicago, June 15.—New wheat from Oklahoma began to be sold here today, and is under contract to be delivered in this city the first half of July. The effect was a prompt lowering of the relative value of nearby options and at the same time an improvement in the quotations for the months more distant.

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COTTON FIGURES CONFINED WITHIN NARROW RANGE

Liverpool Trade Conditions Reported In Unsatisfactory Condition.

New York, June 15.—The cotton market continued quiet today with fluctuations irregular within a range of 1/4 to 3/4 points and the close easy and net loss of 2 to 3 points.

The opening was steady at a decline of 1/4 to 3/4 points in response to disappointing cables. There was not a great deal of cotton for sale, however, and during the middle of the day the price steadied up to a net gain of about 1 to 1 1/2 points on the general list, as the result of scattered covering and a little bull support which appeared to be encouraged by reports of rain in the eastern belt, and apprehensions that the wet weather would lead to a less bearish July bureau than anticipated.

Support did not become at all general, however, and late in the day the market eased off under realizing with last prices at practically the lowest. Private cables attributed the indifferent showing of the Liverpool market to less satisfactory trade conditions and said that about the time was being resorted to in manufacturing circles.

Reports of curtailment abroad in connection with the increasing curtailment among domestic mills, having some influence in the direction of offsetting the strong statistical position while news as to the outlook for the new crop are confused by the favorable reports from western and central sections of the belt which contrast with the talk of too much rain in the eastern belt and numerous advices reporting the presence of boll weevil in all the districts infested last year.

A week from next Tuesday will be the first July notice day in the local market, and there has been nothing in recent trading to indicate any big speculative short interest still outstanding. Southern spot markets were generally unchanged.
