

HOGAN SURRENDERED THE RAYLE HEARING FATE WITH THE JURY

Bad Been Dogging Officers a Year. Many Witnesses and All of Sumner Noted Williams Postoffice Conspiracy Two Serious Charges.

Sapp Hogan, the most wanted negro in Greensboro, voluntarily surrendered to Officers Jenkins and McConiston yesterday afternoon, and in less than five minutes he was safely situated behind the bars that have been awaiting him for the past year. During Hogan's year of ad ventures in Greensboro and vicinity he has received credit for a number of crimes, mostly of a trivial nature, but within the past two weeks he has displayed the spirit that always develops with the self consciousness that you are a little smarter than the officers and two crimes have been directly charged to him which, if proven, will surely result in his getting a long sentence.

The first offense of a serious nature came a week or so ago when he cut a negro into shreds and growing hoarder, so the police theorize, he decided that Everett Hamilton was a menace to the community and attempted to confront him in plain clothes, firing a pistol twice, singeing his stock of documents, but failing in his attempt to assassinate him. He is in the present place of confinement for the night.

A stated Hogan has been wanted for the past year and a half, and no special effort has been made to catch him, the officers say, because it is more difficult to bring him in than to capture that Hogan's other hoards have failed but in some instances were against Hogan, and he could not get away from them but would return to the police. It is said that he is a member of the gang that is now being sought by the police.

The officers still maintain the utmost caution regarding the case, and the nature of the evidence against Rayle has not been known.

The general impression is that it is an unusual case of a negro being tried for killing a white man.

The defendant has engaged one John A. Johnson to represent him, while the prosecution will be conducted by John N. Wilson.
