

## HOUSE REFUSED TO PASS THE IMMIGRATION BILL

By Vote of 213 to 114, or Lacking Just Five Votes, It Allowed President's Vote to Stand.

Washington, Feb. 19.—The house today refused, by a vote of 213 to 114, to pass the Dillingham-Burnett immigration bill over the President's veto. Five votes changed from the negative to the affirmative would have given the two-thirds necessary to override the veto.

Opposition to the measure was renewed as soon as Representative Burnett, of Alabama, chairman of the immigration committee, moved that the bill be reconsidered and passed over the President's veto.

Representatives Goldfogle, of New York, and Curley, of Massachusetts, delayed action for about two hours by demanding the reading of the bill, covering 26 printed pages, the President's message and the message from the senate.

Representative Burnett, appealing to the house to override the veto, declared that Secretary of Commerce and Labor Nagel's report, upon which the President based his action was "bursting with misinformation and misstatements."

In order that these changes shall be effective Judge Noyes has in his decision held that Mylius was not convicted of a crime involving moral turpitude.

"It is proper to emphasize," he said, "that no conclusion which I may reach in interpreting these immigration statutes can be regarded as in the slightest degree minimizing the serious character of the practitioner's acts as disclosed, nor as reflecting in any way upon the fairness and regularity of his trial. If the petitioner be discharged it will be solely because I regard the offense of criminal libel as not involving in its inherent nature, moral turpitude."

Mylius this afternoon left Ellis Island declaring that he was ready for a new start in life. "The action of the court in freeing me is a slap at the aristocracy of England and at all forms of monarchy," he said. "No one can regard the action as a means of upholding the aristocracy. For me it amounts to a vindication."

He will remain, for a time at least, in New York.

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## MAY HOLD REPUBLICAN CONVENTION NEXT FALL

Root, Crane, et al. Favor National Gathering With the Object of Revising Rules Relative to Delegates.

Washington, Feb. 19.—Prospect for a Republican national convention next fall to revise rules governing the selection of national delegates, and to change the basis of southern representation at regular Republican conventions was strengthened today through expressions favoring the proposed national gathering by Senator Root, of New York, and Senator Crane, of Massachusetts.

Demand for a Republican convention had been based on the desire to make such changes that states will have the opportunity to select their delegates through primaries or otherwise and to cut down the number of delegates from states having a light Republican vote.

Representatives Goldfogle, of New York, and Curley, of Massachusetts, delayed action for about two hours by demanding the reading of the bill, covering 26 printed pages, the President's message and the message from the senate.

Second, to permit the Republicans of each state to elect delegates to national conventions in their own way, so that the choice in each state will be regulated according to the laws of the state.
