CAPT. SMITH IS DEAD AFTER LONG ILLNESS

Death Came to Old Railroad Man Late Yesterday—Had Served 45 Years.

BURIAL TO BE SATURDAY

Capt. E. H. Smith, one of Greensboro's most highly respected and prominent citizens, died yesterday evening at 7 o'clock at St. Leo's hospital at the age of 73 years.

The deceased was born in Charleston, S. C., where he spent his boyhood days. His parents had gone to Charleston from Oxford, England, only a few years prior to his birth.

When Mr. Smith entered the service of the Southern railway at Company Shops he began a career of 45 years' service with that company.

December 21, 1863, the deceased was married to Miss Frances A. Clendenin, of Alamance county. His wife died May 28, 1913, lacking just one week of being a year ago.

ASHBORO HAPPENINGS

Ashboro, May 21.—A special train over the Norfolk Southern arrived here from Aberdeen at 10 o'clock this morning carrying the newly elected president Joseph W. Young, Vice President Hix, Mr. Perry, a New York banker, chairman of the board of directors; Mr. Kyle, traffic manager; Colonel Rodman, general counsel; Mr. Nicholson, chief engineer; Mr. Ackers, general superintendent; Mr. Sasser, superintendent of motive power, who are on a tour of inspection of the Norfolk Southern railroad.

News reached here yesterday of the death of Garland Blair, who was killed in an automobile accident at Republic, Washington. Mr. Blair is the son of the late J. Addison Blair, and Mrs. Martha A. Blair, who resides in Ashboro.

Mrs. E. L. Fox, widow of the late Dr. William A. Fox, died Tuesday night at the home of her daughter, Mrs. W. F. Matthews at Randleman. She has been an invalid for more than a year.

PRIMARY RULES REVISED

Complete Reenrollment of Democratic Voters in Clubs Required. Columbia, S. C., May 21.—Revision of the rules governing state wide primaries, designed to prevent fraud and irregularities, was effected here today by the Democratic state convention.

The new regulations provide for a complete reenrollment of Democratic voters in the various voting clubs and make it necessary for each voter desiring to qualify for the primary to make application and sign the club roll. Residence qualifications also were revised.

Plans made by the Democratic state committee for the coming state primary for the nomination of state and federal officers provide for one official meeting in each of the 44 counties of the state at which all candidates for state offices and candidates for United States senator will be given an opportunity to speak.

THREE OLD MEMBERS OF BOARD RENAMED

In Morehead Township H. S. Patterson Received Majority Over Weatherly.

BIG VOTE AT THE MILLS

The three old members of the board of county commissioners, T. A. Wilson, J. A. Rankin and W. C. Tucker, were nominated for reelection yesterday in the second primary, C. A. Wharton receiving the lowest vote.

In Morehead township H. S. Patterson was nominated for constable over W. J. Weatherly, Mr. Patterson receiving a majority of 42 votes.

The greatest change noticeable in the vote was in North Gilmer precinct which includes the mill villages. The highest vote there last Saturday was for Rankin, who received 173 votes.

Steel Employees Indicted.

Pittsburgh, Pa., May 21.—A federal grand jury here today made a presentment recommending the indictment of five employees of the Carbon Steel company on a charge of conspiracy in connection with steel furnished for locks in the Panama canal.

Senate Will Mend Its Pace.

Washington, May 21.—The senate tonight decided to mend its pace a bit in an effort to arrange adjournment of Congress by the middle of July.

Dr. Griffith Found Guilty.

Greensboro, Pa., May 21.—Dr. Martin E. Griffith, of Monesson, Pa., was convicted here today of voluntary manslaughter in having caused the death of William J. Robinson, a Pittsburgh music teacher. Testimony had formerly operated on Robinson, whom he alleged had attacked Mrs. Griffith in her home.

Special Appropriation.

Washington, May 21.—A special \$6,835,000 appropriation bill, designed chiefly to provide funds to meet past and expected army expenditures up to June 30 next, because of the Mexican demeritization, was passed today by the house.

President to Speak at Arlington.

Washington, May 21.—President Wilson decided today to speak at Arlington national cemetery on June 4, when the monument to Confederate dead is to be dedicated.

Daniels Appoints Militia Board.

Washington, May 21.—Secretary Daniels today appointed a board of naval militia officers to consider matters generally pertaining to the country's naval militia. Members of the new board include Capt. C. D. Bradshaw, N. M., North Carolina.
