### GERMANY'S POLICY ON REPARATIONS IS READY Will Be Made Known By Berlin Gov-ernment Today-Will Go the "Extreme Limit."

Berlin, April 22.—A cabinet council will meet this evening and tomorrow the German government will make known its policy on the question of reparations.

Simons, the foreign minister, made this announcement in the reich-stag today in speaking of the willing-ness of the American government to transmit German reparations proposals


transmit German reparations proposals to the ailled governments in a manner acceptable to them.

The foreign minister said:

"The German government will have to make a decision concerning the establishment of a basis for its propositions. A cabinet council will meet this evening and tomorrow the government will make known its policy on the reparations question. The government is convinced that in drawing up this project it must go to the extreme limit of what the German people can furnish in the way of reparations."
