HEALTH OFFICIALS TO CONFER AT DANVILLE

They Will Discuss Plans For Improving the City's Milk Supply.

ROBERT T. COLE IS DEAD

(Special to Daily News.)

Danville, Va., Nov. 8.—Danville health officials will tomorrow hold a conference with officials of the state with reference to improving Danville's supply of milk and throwing around it such safeguards as will render remote the possibility of a typhoid outbreak occasioned by impure milk bottles. Dr. C. C. Hudson, health officer of Richmond; J. A. Strauch, of the dairy inspection division, and C. L. Stahl, also of Richmond, will play a part in these conferences. It is proposed to draw up definite recommendations to be passed on by the council this week including an ordinance covering the points to be debated.

The purveyors of milk have retained counsel and will be represented at the meetings as the health authorities desire to have expressions from them. There is little doubt that the milk men will actively fight the adoption of the milk grading ordinance now proposed. On Saturday the dairy producers will hold a meeting here with the purpose of forming a central distributing and pasteurization plant. An option has been secured on property at Five Forks and it is said, \$50,000 capital has been promised.

Henry W. Dwyer, of Winston-Salem, N. C., was toastmaster tonight at the "father and son" banquet which was held at the Y. M. C. A. auditorium and which was largely attended.

Robert Temple Cole, a tobaccoist widely known in the south and in Europe, died suddenly at six o'clock this morning at his home on Main street from angina pectoris.

News of his death came as a great shock to the people of this community for few knew that he had returned from England. He arrived here on Saturday, suffering from a severe attack of heart trouble and he was brought safely through a severe attack yesterday. He was showing improvement last night but this morning he was again attacked and he died ten minutes after the family physician arrived.

Mr. Cole, who was secretary of the firm of John B. Hughes company, incorporated, left several weeks ago on one of his periodical business trips to London. While he was in mid-ocean two of his children, Mordcael and Margaret Cole, were taken with typhoid fever and were seriously ill when he reached Liverpool. He was apprised of this condition and this combined with a sudden revelation of heart trouble hastened his return home.

He was born in Caroline county 40 years ago, being a son of Robert W. and Mrs. Lucy Broadus Cole. His early life was spent in or about Richmond. He came to Danville seven years ago as foreign representative of the Hughes Tobacco company. He was married to Miss Hattie Heckman, of Richmond, who survives with four children, Robert Cole, of Richmond; Temple Cole, of Virginia Military Institute, and Misses Mordcael and Margaret Cole. The funeral will be held here sometime tomorrow.

The local police were advised today that George Landors, husband of Mrs. Laura Dodson Landors, had been arrested in Washington on the charge of non support. Mrs. Landors who married him in Norfolk some months ago asked the police three months ago to find him and bring him to book. Landors is being held at Washington pending his return to this city when he will be tried for wife desertion.

The only important development in the killing of James Pruitt, it is alleged by one of his brothers, Lloyd or Joseph Pruitt, at Park Springs on Sunday evening was the discovery today of an alleged eye-witness to the shooting. Sheriff Gunn said that he had found Robert Graves, a negro, who states that he was 50 yards from the spot where Pruitt was shot down from a buggy containing his two brothers. The negro is quoted as saying that he is not sure which of the brothers held the weapon but he expressed the belief that it was Lloyd Pruitt.

The Caswell authorities spent yesterday and today combing the Park Springs section where several members of the Pruitt family live. Hensons were searched and brothers of the Pruitts questioned. The sheriff said he had secured little valuable information from these sources and he admitted that there were marked resemblances. The belief prevails that the two brothers who are sought for murder are hiding in the woods. No definite information bearing on the quarrel leading to the murder has been found. All that can be learned is that it was due to some domestic affair.

Miss Pearl Gertrude Coble and Thomas Moses Hutcheson, both of Pittsylvania county, were married here last night by Rev. Samuel Jones, pastor of the Danville circuit, at his home in North Danville.
