

MORE TOBACCO BEING SOLD AT REIDSVILLE

Much Common Tobacco Pull the Averages Down—New Past- tor At Reidsville.

Reidsville, Nov. 8.—Tobacco is coming in quite freely. Monday's breaks were the heaviest of the season so far and the sales lasted until well in the afternoon. Prices are still on the up grade though the warehouse averages were a little off Thursday and Friday owing to a preponderance of the low grades. A noticeable advance in the \$2 to \$3 grades has recently taken place, though these grades are still ridiculously low in comparison with medium and fine types. It is a fact, however, that the low grades in this crop are the most common ever known and are almost worthless for manufacturing purposes.

Rev. M. P. Moore, assigned by the Western North Carolina conference to Main Street M. E. church, began his pastorate here most auspiciously Sunday when his splendid discourses were heard by unusually large numbers of Methodists as well as people from other denominations. 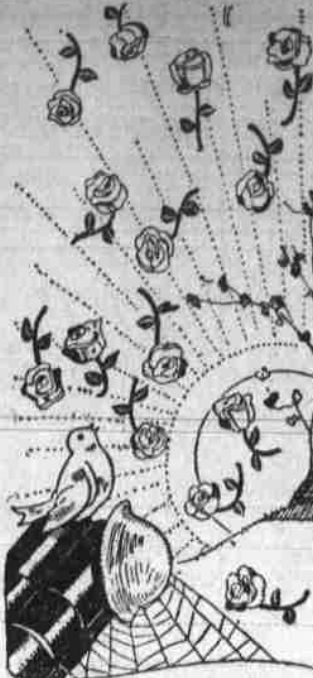
