Prices are still on the up grade though the warehouse averages were a little off Thursday and Priday owing to a preponderance of the low grades. A noticeable advance in low grades. A noticeable advance in the \$2 to \$5 grades has recently taken place, though these grades are still ridiculously low in comparison with medium and fine types. It is a fact, however, that the low grades in this crop are the most common ever known and are almost worthless for manufac-

turing purposes.


