Justice Stacy did not sit in this

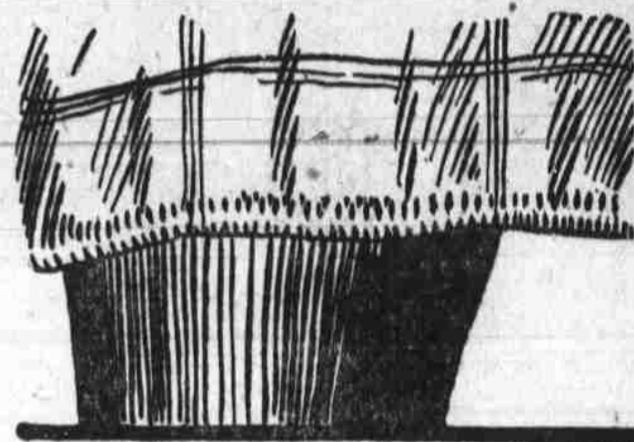

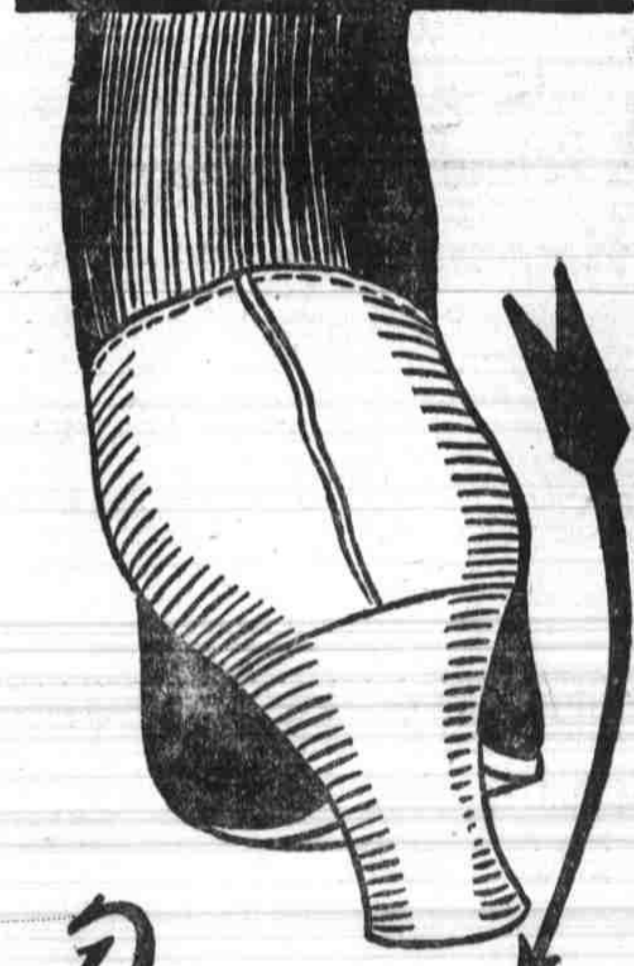

#### SLIGHT DECLINE IN THE ESTIMATED CORN CROP

Crop Will Total 3,151,000,000 Bushels, the Government Forecast Says.

Estimates of Other Crops. Washington, Nov. 9.—The corn crop this year amounts to 3,151,000,000 bushels, the department of agriculture announced today in its preliminary estimate.

Corn production in southern states this year, according to the preliminary estimate of the department of agriculture, will be: Virginia 40,511,000 bushels; North Carolina 66,122,000; Georgia 87,975,000; Tennessee 92,517,000; Alabama 72,570,000; Mississippi 42,968,000; and Louisiana 43,886,000.

Tobacco production according to the preliminary estimate, will be: Virginia 86,660,000 pounds; North Carolina 21,424,000; South Carolina 27,188,000; Florida 4,560,000; Kentucky 27,250,000; Tennessee 40,800,000.

The corn crop declined slightly throughout the country during October, today's preliminary estimate being 11-168,000 bushels less than was forecast a month ago.

Preliminary estimates of other crops were announced as follows: Buckwheat 14,889,000 bushels; potatoes 216,076,000; sweet potatoes, 165,441,000; tobacco (pounds) 1,329,874,000; flaxseed 5,560,000; pears 2,780,000; apples 102,290,000; sugar beets (tons) 7,430,000; Kafrs 125,724,000; peanuts 32,161,000.

Weights per measured bushel of grains were announced as follows: Wheat 56.6 pounds; oats 28.3; barley 44.4.

Stocks of old corn on farms November 1 were estimated at 281,472,000 bushels, or 8.7 per cent of the 1920 crop.

#### 6,646,136 BALES GINNED TO FIRST OF NOVEMBER

Census Bureau Makes Cotton Report. The Average Gross Weight of Bales Is 502.5 Pounds.

Washington, Nov. 9.—Cotton ginned prior to November 1 amounted to 6,646,136 running bales, including 111,150 round bales, 11,778 bales of American-Egyptian, and 1,698 bales of sea island, the census bureau announced today.

The average gross weight of bales this year was announced as 502.5 pounds, compared with 511.2 pounds last year.

Last year to November 1 there had been ginned 7,608,422 bales, including 123,023 round bales, 23,923 bales of American-Egyptian and 540 bales of sea island.

Ginning by states to November 1 this year follow: Alabama 512,858; Arizona 12,840; Arkansas 424,668; California 7,263; Florida 2,471; Georgia 726,900; Louisiana 226,964; Mississippi 642,513; Missouri 25,202; North Carolina 681,974; Oklahoma 436,512; South Carolina 622,076; Tennessee 222,395; Texas 1,227,730; Virginia 10,432; all other states 5,129.
