## BAPTIST MINISTER AT SELMA HAS RESIGNED

Rev. H. Townsend To Become Evangelist For Eastern North Carolina. Want New Passenger Station.

Selma, Dec. 5.—At the conclusion of the regular service at the First Baptist church Sunday morning Rev. H. Townsend tendered his resignation as pastor to take effect January 1, 1922. Mr. Townsend has served this church as pastor for two years, and his resignation was received with deep regret, not only by the Baptist congregation, but by the people of Selma, where he is very popular. Mr. Townsend has been elected by the Baptist state convention as an evangelist for eastern North Carolina, and will take this work at the first of the new year.

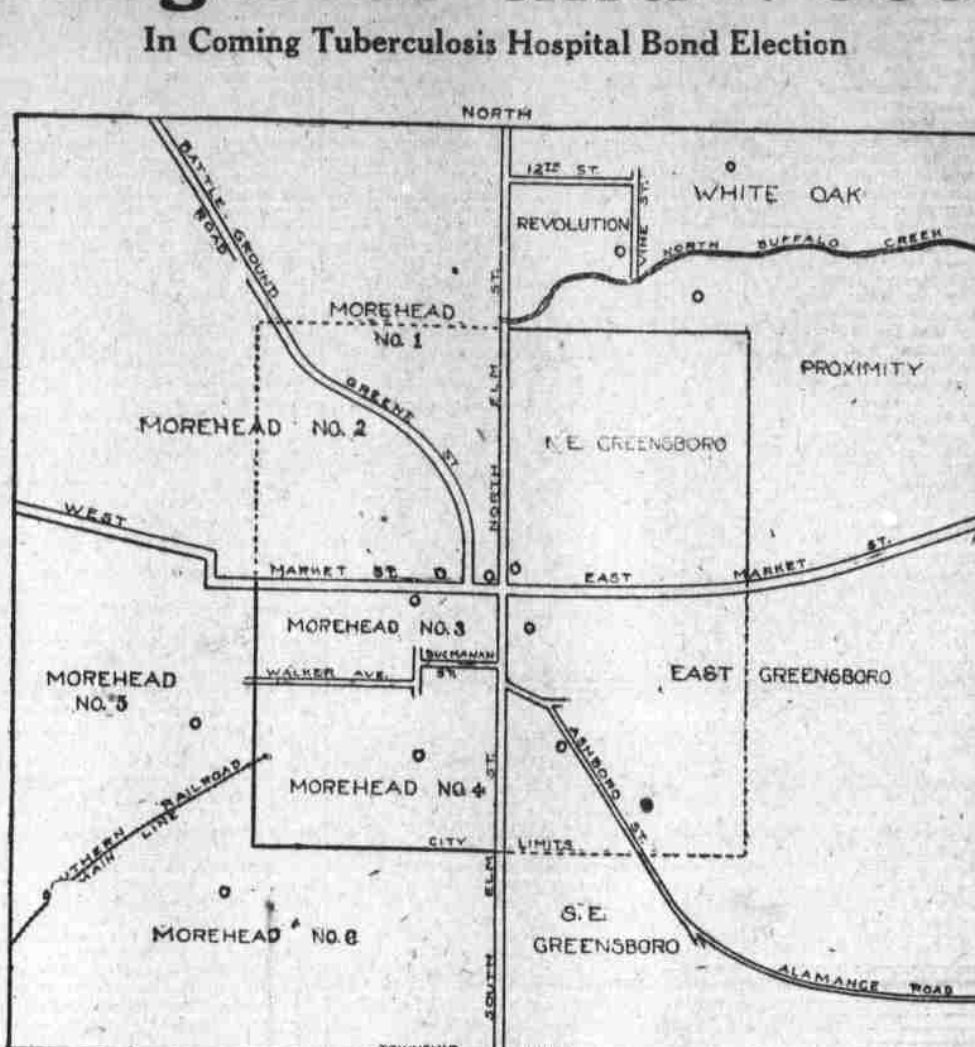
