A GREAT STRIDE FORWARD

Next Step to be Taken by Conference is That of Bringing France and Also Italy into Armament Limitation Program. (By Associated Pres.)
Washington, Dec. 15.—The first great

stride toward a five power treaty limiting naval armaments was taken to-might when the United States. Great Britain and Japan announced a final agreement on the American "5-5-3" The next step-elaboration of the agreement to include France and Italy—was initiated immediately into the new naval committee of fifteen, in

which all five powers are represented.

Agreement among the three major naval powers was reached on the basis of a "status quo" understanding as to fortification of the Pacific islands, at the same time the United States and Great Britain acceded to Japan's de-sire to retain her newest battleship, the Mutsu, with proportionate changes in the American and British fleets. While the principles of the original

While the principles of the original American proposal were not impaired by the triangular agreement, the settlement contemplates the following changes in fleets to be retained: Great Britain, 20 ships instead of 22, with an aggregate of 582,050 tons instead of 504,450 tons.

United States, 18 ships as originally proposed, but with an aggregate of 525,000 tons instead of 500,650 tons.

Japan, ten ships as originally proposed, but with an aggregate of 313,200 tons instead of 299,700 tons.

In the senate this interpretation of the treaty caused a small sensation. Senator Borah said:

"It is utterly inconceivable to me that the United States would undertake to guarantee protection to Japan herself, Australia, and New Zealand. When the treaty was first announced several of us read the guarantee clause in it as obligating this government to make that guarantee if the treaty were ratified.

"We said nothing about it, because we were not sure. It is beyond our hopes that those who wrote the treaty would admit that the guarantee clause protects Japan herself. In my mind, it means that the reaty will certainly be killed in the senate."

Senator Borah, who was leaving for New York, said that he would have more to say about the four party treaty from the floor of the senate, as soon as he returned to Washington. This interpretation at least gives to Mr. Borah a talking point and it is what he has been waiting for. He and the other opponents of the pact have felt that if they could obtain ground of attack upon the treaty which would protract debate and precipitate discussion in the newspapers they could talk the new treaty to death as the Versailles treaty was talked to death.

A reservation might be attached to the treaty by the senate expressly excluding the islands of Japan proper from its operations. But the Anglo-Japanese treaty is made to terminate only upon the ratification of the new pact. And it is doubtful whether the Japanese government would accept such a reservation and would surrend-

No unmistakable deciaration interpreting the pact has been officially made by the American, British or Japanese deceases, out the british explanation was flat and full and comes from a high source. There can be little doubt that the British and Japanese understand the new treaty as applying to the Japanese islands

Even if the Americans should give it a more limited meaning the fact would remain that two of the three powers participating in the confer-ence that drafted it regarded it as applying broadly and this would be enough to give the irreconciliables and

As the opponents look at it, this inclusion of the Mikado's dominions within the purview of the treaty is the price which Mr. Highes had to pay for the termination of the Angio-Japanese alliance. In regard to security Japan has a preferred position in the pact as interreted by the British spokesman. The powers agree to respect, not only her outlying islands but her home terri-tory, and in both cases to consider whether to come to her assistance in case of attack by powers outside the group. The United States obtains the group. The United States obtains the same assurances, but only with regard to the islands in the Pacific, such as the Philippines and Guam. Great-Brittain receives the same assurance, but only with regard to Australia, New Zealand and other island possessions to the Pacific. in the Pacific
