### LAY CORNERSTONE FOR ORPHANAGE HOSPITAL

Grand Lodge of Masons Conducts Ceremony at Oxford—A. J. Harris Is Orator.

Oxford, Dec. 23.—The grand lodge of Masons of North Carolina met in special session in Oxford today for the laying of the cornerstone of the William J. Hicks memorial hospital to be built at the Oxford orphanage. The exercises were presided over by Grand Master J. Bailey Henderson, assisted by the following members of the grand lodge acting as deputy officers for those absent: Charles V. York, A. B. Andrew, R. M. Poteat, W. F. Smith, W. B. Ballou, C. E. Grand Master B. S. Royster introduced the orator of the day, Worshipful Grand Steward A. J. Harris, of Henderson, who in a forceful address paid a glowing tribute to the memory of Col. W. J. Hicks, the beloved superintendent, who gave so many years of his life in work among the orphans of this institution and for whom the hospital is named. He also spoke in words of the highest commendation of Grand Master J. Bailey Henderson and Past Grand Master Gen. B. S. Royster, who have been instrumental in raising large sums for the hospital. The impressive service of laying the cornerstone was witnessed by the entire student body, faculty, grand lodge and large assemblage of friends of the institution.

At an impressive service last Friday preparations had been made for the cornerstone laying of this building which is to cost \$100,000. Work will be suspended until \$100,000 has been subscribed. 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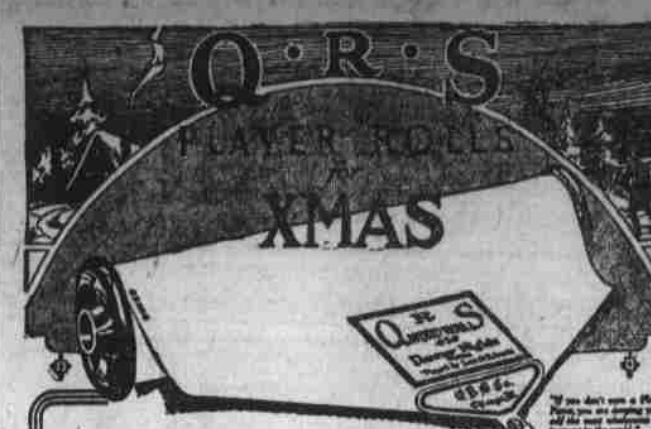
