**HEAVY MOVEMENT OF FREIGHT IS SHOWN**

Week Ending October 28 Was Heaviest Since Late in October 1920.

Washington, Nov. 8.—Volume of traffic on the country's railroads again assumed record breaking proportions with the end of October, the American Railway association, through its car service division, reporting today that the total number of cars loaded with revenue freight by American roads in the week ending October 28, was 1,014,000 cars. On only one other week in railroad history, during October, 1920, has more freight been carried, and the loading this year resulted after several successive weeks of heavy freight business.

The figures also showed that 602,018 cars out of the total loaded in the week given carried general merchandise, or materials not usually classified as among the heavy raw commodities, which was by far the greatest amount of such freight moved in one week.

The association reported further that locomotive and car repairs were being turned out at a more rapid rate on most of the roads.

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**Samuel Gompers Pleased With Result of Election**

Washington, Nov. 8.—The results of the election "are a magnificent vindication of every contention made by the American Federation of Labor," Samuel Gompers, president of the federation, declared in a statement tonight.

"One after another, the stalwart old defenders of privilege, greed, oppression and reaction went down to defeat," he added. "Compulsory labor, injunction, the over-riding of laws, constitution, the railroad labor board, the sales tax, the ship subsidy—these were things typifying the general concept that was repudiated and condemned so forcefully and overwhelmingly."

Ottawa, Nov. 8.—Republican reserves in yesterday's election in the United States were interpreted here today largely as a reaction from the Republican tariff bill, which is unpopular in Canada.
