State Federation Notes

Mrs. J. Eugene Kelley, of Charlotte, chairman of the program for the southeastern council meeting at Pinehurst, announces that the council will formally open on Tuesday evening December 1, at 8:30. Addresses of welcome will be extended Mrs. Sidney P. Cooper, president of the North Carolina federation, and Miss Margaret Gibson, of Wilmington, state director of the general federation. Mrs. J. E. Hays, president of the southeastern council will respond. Mrs. W. K. Jennings, of Florida, first vice-president of the general federation, will bring greetings from that organization and speak upon some of the most vital phases of the federation's work. A reception will be afternoon program. Mrs. Hays by Mrs. Cooper upon the adjournment of the evening session.

Wednesday morning will be devoted to the business of the Council, followed by a luncheon and an afternoon session, at which time Mrs. Alonzo Richardson, chairman of the general federation's citizenship committee, will talk on "Training for Citizenship". She will be followed by one of North Carolina's ablest women on "Woman's Responsibility as an American Citizen". A discussion on legislation in the southeastern states will conclude the afternoon program. A ride to Samarcand and a tea given by the club women of the eighth district is in prospect.

The evening program will be devoted to the subject of motion pictures. Turner Jones, who has been cooperating so successfully with the Atlanta club women in the interest of better films, will be the attraction. He will be followed by Dr. Chester Marshall, one of the most prominent clergymen in New England, sent out by the Committee of Twenty representing the largest national civic and social organizations, who will speak from three angles: Relation of the Church to the Theatre; Constructive Religious Use of Pictures; and Constructive Community Program for the Betterment of Pictures. Other prominent speakers, whose prominence in national affairs cannot fail to give them interested and attentive audiences, will be announced later. The music for the council will be furnished by the Atlanta Music club and some of North Carolina's most gifted musicians. Mrs. Cooper has planned a most interesting program for the North Carolina club meeting which follows the southeastern council meeting, beginning Thursday morning and continuing through the day.

The "Carolina" has been selected as headquarters and all sessions will be held in this beautiful hotel. Leonard Tutt has made a special rate for club women and those desiring to attend should write directly to the hotel.

Those invited to attend are the club women of Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, Florida, Alabama, Kentucky and Tennessee. The object of the Southeastern Council is to promote federation club interests, to discuss problems peculiar to this section of the country and to stimulate greater interest in the general federation. The Council will organize only those clubs aged and Mrs. J. E. Hays, of Georgia, is president; Mrs. Hugh Murrill, of Charlotte, N. C. is vice president, and Miss Zella Armstrong, of Tennessee, secretary.

Every North Carolina club woman is hostess to the Southeastern Council, and should feel it a duty, as well as a privilege, to be present to assist our State president, Mrs. Cooper, in receiving the club women from other states and extending an unlimited hospitality to these sister federates.

Intensive Membership Drive

Beginning now and continuing till the Southeastern Council meeting at Pinehurst, the membership committee of the North Carolina federation, Mrs. E. H. Griffin, of Raleigh, chairman, will conduct an intensive campaign for new federated clubs. Mrs. Griffin has sent out letters to all departmental heads and district chairmen in the state federation announcing the drive; and with proper assistance from the club women of the State, will undoubtedly bring a large number of new clubs into the federation.

Splendid Year for Chapel Hill

The community club of Chapel Hill has begun most enthusiastically another year's work under the efficient leadership of Mrs. Sturgis E. Leavitt. More than two hundred members are registered in the Year Book, and that offers a working force with fine possibilities for the club and the village itself.

At the first regular business meeting of the club last week, a brief report from the chairman on the various departments of the club indicated that a variety of interesting themes are to be pursued this season. The literature department is to present a program dealing largely with contemporary drama, but offering a triple interest: each meeting is to consist of an informal review of some book of recent note, a glance at some bit of modern poetry, and then the reading of one or two brief plays. The home economics department will take up household decoration, an exceedingly interesting feature of their study course being a lecture by Mr. G. Murray Nelson, architect of Raleigh, on the subject of doors and arches. The health department is offering a most attractive opportunity to the women of Chapel Hill to hear a series of eight health lectures and eight lessons in physical exercise by Miss Farnelle, formerly an assistant to Miss Crockett. The department of education is centering its interest upon the aspects of the race problem which are met in Chapel Hill. A commission consisting of a member from each club in town, later to be expanded by additional representatives from other interested organizations, has been appointed to consider such problems as arise in the village, and to seek a way around difficulties.

Excellent Speaker for Art.

One of the most interesting lecturers who has ever appeared before a Raleigh audience is Frank Alvah Parsons, of New York, the most widely quoted lecturer on interior decorating and costume designing in this country. Last year, he gave two lectures to the Raleigh club women, and they have already arranged to have him again this year. Since the Raleigh club will bear the considerable item of this lecturer's expenses from New York city to this state, it would be decidedly to the advantage of other North Carolina clubs to secure his services after his appearance in Raleigh. The charge for one lecture is \$75, and for two lectures \$135. Clubs or art departments desiring to secure Mr. Parsons may do so by writing Mrs. R. L. McMillan, chairman of the art department of the Raleigh Woman's club.

Business For Ex-Service Men.

After the wonderful response made by the clubs in North Carolina last

year in sending boxes and stockings to the ex-service men and women who are patients at our government hospitals in the Carolinas, there should not be a club in the state that will not desire to show our love and appreciation of these men and women.

At Oteen, there are over 80 nurses who are bed patients. Christmas boxes for these girls are needed; 800 filled stockings are wanted for men patients at Oteen. The U. S. V. hospital number 28, at Greenville, S. C., needs 150 attractive Christmas boxes. Won't our club undertake to fill some of these needs?

The Red Cross authorities at each of the above hospitals urgently request that all stockings and boxes reach the hospitals by December 15; so that they may be carefully checked, and that they may know how many individual patients have been provided for. It is suggested that a card giving the name of the club sending each box be included; so that the patients may acknowledge receipt of same, if he or she is not too ill to do so.

Mrs. Isaac Hardaman, of Charlotte, chairman of the state federation's committee on friendly relations with the ex-service men, has sent out letters to every club in the State, outlining the needs of the hospitals, as given above, and is looking for one hundred per cent response from every club. Club women are asked to advise Mrs. Hardaman how many boxes their club will send this year.

Branch Added to Lumberton Club.

The Lumberton Woman's club, Mrs. A. H. McLeod president, has just completed the organization of a Business and Professional Women's unit as a branch of their club. This unit will meet at a time to suit the convenience of the women who are in business and have been cut off heretofore from attendance upon club meetings.
