WHISKY VIOLATION ASSESSMENTS LARGE. Fines and Penalties Imposed on Violators Ending June 30, Are \$3,142,594.74. (By Associated Press.) Salisbury, Nov. 25.—That the total expenditure incident to enforcement of the federal prohibition law throughout the nation amounts to less than half as much as the amount collected by administrative officials was disclosed in a statement issued by E. A. Kohlen, a federal prohibition director of North Carolina, today.

Actual collections, running costs, forfeitures and fines effected under the operation of the law for the nation for the fiscal year ending June 30, are given in the statement.

Fines and penalties imposed on violators amounted to \$2,142,594.74. The value of the property seized was estimated at \$8,000,000, while forfeitures and taxes reached \$8,121,309.95.

"In other words," said the director, "the cost of putting into effect the operation of the prohibition law in the United States during 1922 was \$8,000,000, while the total amount collected totaled \$14,121,309.95, or more than double the operating costs."

The statement, in part, follows: "Fines and penalties, fiscal year ending June 30, 1922, \$2,142,594.74; cost of enforcement, fiscal year ending June 30, 1922, \$8,143,994.20; cost of enforcement, fiscal year ending June 30, 1921, \$6,541,294.20; cost of enforcement, fiscal year ending June 30, 1920, \$2,138,562.28; appropriation for fiscal year ending June 30, 1921, \$7,100,000; appropriation for fiscal year ending June 30, 1922, \$7,500,000; appropriation for fiscal year ending June 30, 1923, \$2,250,000."

"Each of the above appropriations includes \$750,000 for enforcement of the narcotic law."

Kinston Teachers Want One of Their Own For Secretary. (Special to Daily News.) Kinston, Nov. 26.—Teachers in the public school here have voted 100 per cent against the election of a non-professional to the secretaryship of the North Carolina Teachers' assembly. "The executive committee wanted an editor for its assembly magazine; they certainly should have sought this person from the professional ranks." That was all there was to the matter so far as the local teachers were concerned, and they met recently to organize and name delegates from the Kinston unit to the state assembly to be held at Raleigh November 29-30 and December 1. The idea that the assembly "needed a publicity agent" was immediately set aside. "It is generally known that teachers have intelligence enough, and a large number have native ability sufficient, to enable them to prepare the necessary publicity matter." It was declared.

Furthermore, according to the unanimous opinion of the instructresses and instructors here, if the committee wanted a "speaker" it could easily find one among its teacher members. Also, to find an organizer, or one in close touch with the "real problems" of the profession, the committee would only have to look among the teachers, it was contended.
