### MUCH LAND CONVEYED IN GUILFORD COUNTY

Property Transactions Recorded Tuesday Involve Approximately \$338,500.

21 DEEDS ARE RECORDED

Realty in Guilford county took a big jump Tuesday as was indicated by the 21 deeds recorded at the county courthouse when property, conveyed in five townships, involved approximately \$338,500. The transfer of property back to J. E. Latham and J. A. Kellenberger by the Irving Auto company was responsible for large amount of money involved. The Irving Auto company (American Southern Motors corporation) by a deed dated on October 30 sold to J. E. Latham and J. A. Kellenberger 17 tracts of land in the northwestern part of the city for about \$186,500. The deed was made by virtue of resolutions passed at a meeting of the Irving Auto company on October 17. The Irving Auto company also sold to J. E. Latham and J. A. Kellenberger for approximately \$13,500 property known as Experimental farm, which was conveyed to the Summit Avenue Building company by heirs of Moses H. Cona, deceased, by a deed dated December 26, 1916.

This property was contracted to be sold and conveyed to the Security Warehouse and Storage company upon payment of the balance of the purchase price, which was specified in the contract. The company then transferred its right and title and interest in the tract to the American Southern Motors corporation by a conveyance of April 2, 1920. The present conveyance was deemed at a recent meeting of the stockholders of the company.

### MAYOR RECITES STORY OF LUMBER INDUSTRY

Tells How Short-Leaf Pine Was Popularized in Making Packing Cases.

WAS ONCE SAWMILL MAN

The absorbing story of the establishment, since 1904, of the North Carolina short-leaf pine packing case industry was told to the Rotary club yesterday by Mayor Claude Kiser. Mr. Kiser's story was mainly that of the South Atlantic Lumber company. Starting as a youngster in the logging business he soon graduated as a handler of steers, operating two and then three yokes of fine cattle. If he had stayed with the cattle he would have been an expert by now for one of his side-partners of boyhood days did, and is. Mr. Kiser did all the jobs in a lumber mill, from a small plant to one of 50,000 feet daily.

When he and his associates began the manufacture of boxing lumber and crating stock their material, "old field" pine, was little known commercially. There was a great demand for box shuck stuff in the north and east, and also a great prejudice against North Carolina pine. Manufacturers said it would split in nailing, which it does, and the concern had numerous cars of stuff rejected at first. They found that while the kind of stock was not suitable for the purpose, air-dried stock is excellent, and takes nails well. They put in the market air-dried rosemary of old field growth, called it by the trade name of "Highland" and taught concerns that herebefore had used only white pine and spruce shooks how to drive nails in yellow pine, which by its strength and lightness is well adapted to the purpose.

In the past 15 years they have handled 500,000,000 feet in this trade, some 25,000 cars, equivalent to a train of 250 to 300 miles' length. Their trade is with textile concerns, mainly. The Standard Oil company uses for crating some 100,000,000 feet of lumber yearly, which is illustrative of the magnitude of the box industry. In one year Mr. Kiser's company has sold 24,000,000 feet to one customer. It was his and another concern which first induced the federal government to make tests of lumber for these purposes, now a regularly established function.

There is a high art in packing, making the containers for various sorts of goods of a maximum strength and minimum lightness, and the South Atlantic company regularly advises manufacturers how they may most economically crate their products. They use stock from 3/4-inch to 3 by 12 inches.

Trustees for the club fund for assistance of college students were named by President Duffy as follows: J. R. Oettinger, chairman, for three years; John N. Wilson, three years; Herman Cone and M. Robins, two years; J. E. Latham and Pierce C. Baker, three years. Tom Pemberton authorized the club to send to the Boy scout organization the use, after April 1, of a four-room house located on his farm property.
