Under the Tutelage Of Captain Pearce 11 Husky Policemen Learn Duties

A reporter for the Daily News at tended classes last night in the only school in Greensboro which gave no holiday Thanksgiving. It was a novel

experience. The lesson was a review of six preceding lessons which had covered the same number of weeks. The class met at 8 o'clock in the Municipal courtroom at the city hall and was in session for an hour The pupils were 11 husky policemen and the teacher was Robert E. Pearce. cap-

The student policemen were alert The student policemen were alert and interested. They stood when an-swering a question. "Correct, sit down!" the teacher would say in nearly every case after propounding a query, for the policemen were usu-

ally quick with a come-back. Those citizens who think solicemen doesn't have to do much but swing a stick and look wise should attend one of the police school classes sometime and have their ideas reversed. The reported sat in the school last night and heard those

the school last night and heard those student policemen glibly anwer questions that would stump the average citizen and in some instances puzzle a well informed lawyer.

The only question, accordingly, seemed to be whether the fillbuster would be broken by the end of the extra measion. Whether sine die adjournment

would be taken tomorrow night by joint resolution or whether the extra sine die adjournment of both house tomorrow night and Republican leaders in the senate indicated such a proposal would be acceptable to


