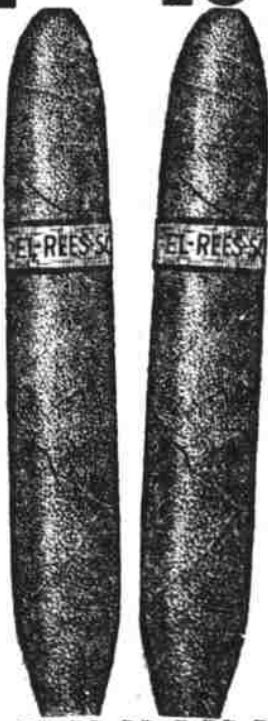

POLICE SCHOOL HAS NO HOLIDAY THANKSGIVING

Under the Tutelage Of Captain Pearce 11 Husky Policemen Learn Duties

MANY POINTS OF LAW

A reporter for the Daily News attended classes last night in the only school in Greensboro which gave no holiday Thanksgiving. It was a novel experience.

The lesson was a review of six preceding lessons which had covered the same number of weeks. The class met at 8 o'clock in the Municipal courtroom at the city hall and was in session for an hour.

Those citizens who think policemen doesn't have to do much but swing a stick and look wise should attend one of the police school classes sometime and have their ideas reversed.

After stressing the importance of obedience, loyalty and respect to the teacher, Captain Pearce asked questions that would stump the average citizen and in some instances puzzle a well informed lawyer.

Questions asked on the subject of crimes and criminals made one think of the many tomes of the law and of that other tower of legal knowledge, Sir Edward Coke. Among the queries were some that would give a law fudging nigger mares and were enough to make even the proverbial Philadelphia lawyer chew a pencil and scratch his head while pawing the air for suitable answers.

Every recruit that signs on with the Greensboro police department is required to complete the course of lessons about 15 in number. There are 14 policemen taking the lessons now. They are W. T. Steele, J. C. Vaughn, E. H. Johnson, C. V. Wyrick, J. L. Mullis, J. M. Church, R. W. Dallas, C. Y. Loman, E. E. Ballenger, D. B. High, H. H. Martin, E. S. Friday, C. Oakley and B. Edwards. Three men have completed six lessons.

The system of classes for policemen was inaugurated in Greensboro about a year ago. Captain Pearce took a special course of training in the work under the late Captain P. W. Auer, for many years connected with the police department of New York.

SMALL MOTOR BOAT IS IN HARBOR AFTER TRIP AROUND ENTIRE WORLD

The Greensboro Book company has on display in their store a beautiful oil painting of "The Banishing of Lucifer from Heaven," which was copied by Amy Lowell Cobb, of this city, and is an exact reproduction of the original masterpiece. Miss Cobb was very fortunate in being able to get the model for this work, it being among the collection of paintings at Belmont Abbey in Belmont, N. C., where she was allowed to make her copy during one of her recent visits to Belmont. The beautiful harmony and blending of colors and the rich, warm tones which she obtained shows the gifts of a real artist.

After leaving Miami the party headed for Panama and thence to Tahiti. From there on to the Samoan Islands, Fiji Islands, New Guinea, Australia, Hermit and Admiralty Islands, Macassar, Bali, Singapore and Sumatra were touched. The trip was made at some of them. Then the journey was taken across the Indian ocean for 4,600 miles with a stop at the Island of Seychells for gasoline. Through the Red sea, 1,800 miles to the Mediterranean, the party passed the Suez canal and chugged into Cairo and Alexandria.

Next visited were Athens, Naples, Rome, Genoa, Monte Carlo, Nice, Marseilles, Barcelona and Gibraltar. Then came the trip along the coast of Africa to the Canary Islands and to Cape Verde and finally to San Juan, Porto Rico and down across to Miami. Three times the Speejacks was reported lost but each time turned out to be only delayed by storms. "If we had taken the advice of tried mariners, we would never have gotten round," said Mr. Gowan. "God must have been right behind us all the way. Again and again we were told to wait because we were striking places in the hurricane season. But I always went straight on and we always happened—just happened—to skip away to safety just in time."

At various points on the trip the Speejacks lost members of her crew. Three times the Speejacks was reported struck out to some certain parts of the world by themselves. Instead of the seven Americans she shipped with the little craft is bringing back two Americans, a Chinese, a Frenchman, a Russian, a Scotchman and one "without a country."

All through the journey Mr. Gowan kept in touch with America by means of radio, and during the trip a message six thousand miles away and always hearing the large broadcasting stations. Seventy-three thousand gallons of gasoline were consumed during the trip and 100,000 feet of film were taken.

The most interesting incident of the whole trip, Mr. Gowan said, was a sea-sick wedding aboard near Tahiti. An American at Tahiti asked Mr. Gowan to do him a favor, which turned out to be marriage outside the three-mile limit, because it was necessary to live a year on the island before being granted a license there. The groom asked when the sea was calmest. I told him between 5 and 8 in the morning. The ceremony was arranged for 6 p. m. A crowd accompanied the prospective bride and groom and we waited away to the three-mile mark. Before we had reached it, the happy party had become so seasick that the captain had to rush through the ceremony without waiting for answers or the ring to be placed on the bride's finger. When we returned it took an hour and a half to get them off the boat.

One of the first to greet Mr. Gowan when he stepped off the Speejacks here was E. H. Thomas, the man who sent the first automobile around the world. Mr. Gowan said that data, film and other facts obtained on the trip would be turned over to scientific institutions. The Speejacks will leave tomorrow for New York, where she will dock at the New York Yacht club.

White House Family Spends A Very Quiet Thanksgiving Washington, Nov. 20.—This was a day of personal as well as traditional Thanksgiving at the White House, Mrs. Harding having dinner in the dining room for the first time since she became critically ill in the latter part of August. Attorney General Daugherty was present and Mrs. Harding's only guest for the Thanksgiving dinner.

DEMOCRATS READY TO CONTINUE FILIBUSTER

Plans Made to Keep Up Stiff Fight On the Dyer Anti-Lynching Bill.

FIGHT IS JUST STARTED

Washington, Nov. 30.—Senate Democrats refreshed by the holiday rest announced tonight they were fully prepared to resume tomorrow their filibuster against the Dyer anti-lynching bill. Republican leaders indicated that the majority was equally prepared to continue its fight in behalf of the measure. The only question, accordingly, seemed to be whether the filibuster would be broken by the end of the extra session.

Whether sine die adjournment would be taken tomorrow night by joint resolution or whether the extra session so far as the senate is concerned would lapse into the regular session Monday noon was a matter on which leaders tonight had made no decision. House leaders were understood to be preparing a resolution for sine die adjournment of both houses tomorrow night and Republican leaders in the senate indicated such a proposal would be acceptable to them.

Democratic senators said they had in store a number of moves designed to prevent the senate from taking up the anti-lynching bill. Senator Harrison, of Mississippi, one of the Democratic floor leaders in the filibuster, said he and his colleagues had just begun to fight.

Tuesday when we started the filibuster the Republicans succeeded after four hours in getting the journal of the previous day approved. Senator Harrison said, "yesterday the Republicans were unable to get even this much done and they will be doing well tomorrow even to get started on the journal of Wednesday's session."

Body of Mrs. W. S. Sergeant Is Laid to Rest in Green Hill

The funeral of Mrs. W. S. Sergeant, a former resident of this city, who died at a Charlotte hospital on Tuesday took place at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon, with services being held at the Hanes chapel. Rev. Charles F. Myers, pastor of the First Presbyterian church, officiated. Interment was in the Green Hill cemetery.

King College Makes Record. Bristol, Va., Tenn., Nov. 30.—King college ends the 1922 football season here today with probably the largest total score of any college in the country. The 21 to 0 victory over Maryville today gives King a total of 458 points for the season as compared with 48 for her opponents. King has lost but two games out of a total of eight played.
