MOTORISTS URGE NEW TRAFFIC REGULATIONS

Committee to Present Proposed Legislation to General Assembly.

PROTECT CAR OWNERS

Originating with ideas and suggestions now being advanced by members of the Carolina Motor Club, Inc., important legislation of deep concern to motor car drivers will likely be presented to the general assembly for enactment when the legislature assembles next month at Raleigh.

From its headquarters here the club has sent out a circular listing 14 suggestions for amendments and changes in laws designed to protect automobile owners and to improve conditions on the public highways.

The circular is broadcasted with the idea of obtaining expressions of opinion from club members as to what is needed to help the motorist.

"Some of the suggestions may be good and some may be bad," said C. W. Roberts, manager of the club. "What we want is to get the ideas of as many members as possible on the subject." The club, it is understood, will name a legislative committee to present such changes as are desired before the general assembly.

One member proposes the adoption of uniform traffic laws for North Carolina and South Carolina, made to conform as far as is practicable with uniform traffic laws now being enacted in many other states.

He thinks such laws would "add efficiency to the enforcement of the traffic regulations and make motoring more of a pleasure."

Another member thinks the Carolina should have a certificate of title act to protect the title to motor vehicles in sales, transfers and ownership and to facilitate the recovery of stolen cars. Such a law, it is stated, is now in force in 14 states.

The circular says a prominent banker member of the club wants a law to regulate the salaries and fees paid the rural officers in the matter of arrest of people using the highway. Enactment of such a law, this member thinks, would stop arrests which are made in order to "help business."

A member urges that some provision should be made whereby the county, when operating motor equipment, would be as liable as any other corporation for damage caused by its equipment when operated contrary to the law causing damage to the individual.

One proposal urges "the absolute necessity of having a law requiring all moving vehicles, whether horse-drawn or otherwise, to carry a light after dark. It is not only unfair to motorists to be subjected to wagons and buggies and horses on the road without proper designation after dark, but it is very dangerous to these people."

Use of two state license plates instead of one is suggested because it is thought the state loses so much advertising when the car is in other states, and because the motorist sometimes experiences difficulty with officials who are not familiar with the law. Among other proposed legislative changes are:

"Licensing of all drivers, including owners of motor vehicles, applicants being required to pass mental and physical examinations and pay a fee of from \$1 to \$5 for drivers' license, which may be revoked."

"Regulation and restriction of the operation of motor buses and trucks on state and inter-county highways. It is suggested that all commercial vehicles should be placed under the jurisdiction of the state corporation commission, and that commercial vehicles using highways should be dealt with as common carriers; that the size, weight and speed of vehicles should be limited by law and that they should be taxed in direct proportion to the benefits which they derive from the use of highways."

"Legislation limiting the jurisdiction of justices of the peace and curtailing the authority of county constables and village magistrates who, it is suggested by some, conduct speed traps for revenue only."

"A law absolutely requiring the dimming of bright lights regardless of any anti-glare lens."

"Legislation requiring every driver and owner of a car operated on the roads and streets to take out liability insurance or give bond for the purpose of protecting an injured person in the event of an accident."

"Tractors, threshing machines, road rollers, etc., should be required to remove lugs, cleats and spikes from their wheels when the same are operated on brick pavement or asphalt roads and highways."
