PRIVATE EGON LANGE IS HELD FOR SHOOTING OF A PRISONER

Washington, Dec. 22.—Private Egon E. Lange, of the 2d cavalry, was under guard tonight at Fort Myer, pending an investigation of the killing of Private Albert Nathan, formerly of the 11th infantry, Camp Meade, Md., a general prisoner of war, according to post officers, Lange, who was on guard duty, shot Nathan after the latter had refused to obey orders and had approached him threateningly.

MUCH MEAT IS WASTED.

Washington, Dec. 22.—The department of commerce in a statement tonight estimated that the per capita consumption of meat in the United States will exceed 150 pounds this year. The estimate was based on returns covering eight months and which were said to show an average slightly above that figure.

Linton, federal reserve bank guard, in a gun battle in front of the United States mint here Monday.
