BERNSTORFF CALLED INTO A CONFERENCE

Washington, March 8.—With Congress standing firmly behind him, the
President was prepared today to go with the submarine negotiation with the Central Paw

After an all day contest such as has seldom been witnessed, the House Las night answered the President's demand for a "show down" on Congress ional sentiment regarding the armed ship issue, and tabled the McLemore resolution to warn Americans off arm ed ships. This action, together with that in the Senate in killing a similar resolution has freed the Presiden from the bonds of the embarrassmen forced upon him by the dissention

His victory complete, was regarded by the President and his advisors, as a sufficient answer to reports circulated in Berlin that he was making de mands on Germany on direct opposi-tion to the sentiment of the select

representatives of the people.

Secretary Lansing today was completing his examination of appendicion to the last German note which contained alleged instances of England merchant ships attacking submarines and under which Germany has sought
