TO MAKE A SANATORIUM OF "MOUNT WEATHER"

Washington, March 27.—"Mount Weather," on top of the Blue Ridge mountains, in Loudoun county, Virginia, has dropped out of the race for a summer White House for the President. Representative Carlin, who early in the present session introduced a bill providing for the use of "Mount Weather" as a summer home for the President, has offered another measure, directing the Agricultural Department to turn the property over to the Treasury Department for a sanatorium to be run by the United States public health service for the benefit of sick merchant seamen and other employees of the government. "Mount Weather" is one of the most beautifully located homes along the Blue Ridge range.

DENTIST CHARGED WITH MURDER HAS A DUAL PERSONALITY, SAYS INVESTIGATOR

"Dr. Arthur Warren Waite, of New York, is guilty of the murder of John E. Peck, the millionaire drug manufacturer of Grand Rapids, Mich." This is the statement of Francis X. Mancuso, head of the homicide department of the New York state's attorney's office, who has investigated the case. He says Waite has a dual personality; that he was at the same time a polished, educated gentleman, and one of the worst criminals of the age.

COINCIDENCES IN THE PECK DEATHS

Mrs. Anna Maria Peck of Grand Rapids, Mich., died at 2 o'clock Sunday morning, January 30, in the home of her son-in-law, Dr. Arthur W. Waite, No. 445 Riverside Drive, New York. Her body was embalmed at 9 o'clock that morning and at 10 o'clock that afternoon was started for Grand Rapids on the New York Central Limited train, the Wolverine. Funeral services were held at Grand Rapids Monday afternoon, and on Tuesday the body was reinterred at Detroit.

John E. Peck, millionaire husband of Mrs. Peck, died at 2 o'clock Sunday morning, March 12, in the home of his son-in-law, Dr. Waite. His remains were embalmed at 2 o'clock and at 3 o'clock that afternoon was started for Grand Rapids on the Wolverine. Funeral services were held at Grand Rapids Monday afternoon, and on Tuesday the body was reinterred at Detroit.

POISONED MILLIONAIRE AND DEAD WIFE

Following the recent death by poisoning of John E. Peck, millionaire druggist of Grand Rapids, Mich., six weeks after the death of his wife, suspicion fastened upon a son-in-law, Dr. Arthur Warren Waite, of New York. Dr. Waite is said to have admitted that he gave the poison to Peck, but did so at the request of the latter, who wished to commit suicide.

Timely Piece of Health Work

The State Board of Health is being congratulated by other State health departments and by noted public health workers on acquiring for her people the public health nursing service that has recently been effected by the State Board of Health and the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company. In the opinion of these noted health experts, this arrangement to institute a nursing service that will sooner or later be extended to all the people of the State is the most timely piece of public health work the State could have undertaken at this time.

This public health nursing service for the State was made possible by the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company

agreeing to pay in part the salary of any local public health nurse in ratio to the number of policy-holders the company has in that town or community. In other words, the company agrees to pay the nurse 50 cents per visit for every visit made to their policy-holders. The company, it is said, has 112,000 policy-holders in North Carolina at this time.

This proposed nursing service as explained by the State Board of Health will combine the district or visiting nurse service, the tuberculosis nurse and the child welfare or mother nursing service, and the nurse is to be known as the public health nurse. According to Miss Ella Phillips Grandall of New York City, authority on public health nursing, this systematized method of public health nursing has proven efficient in the North and West, where it has been more generally employed as public health work.

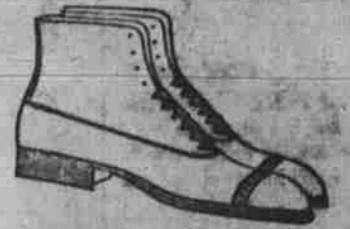
