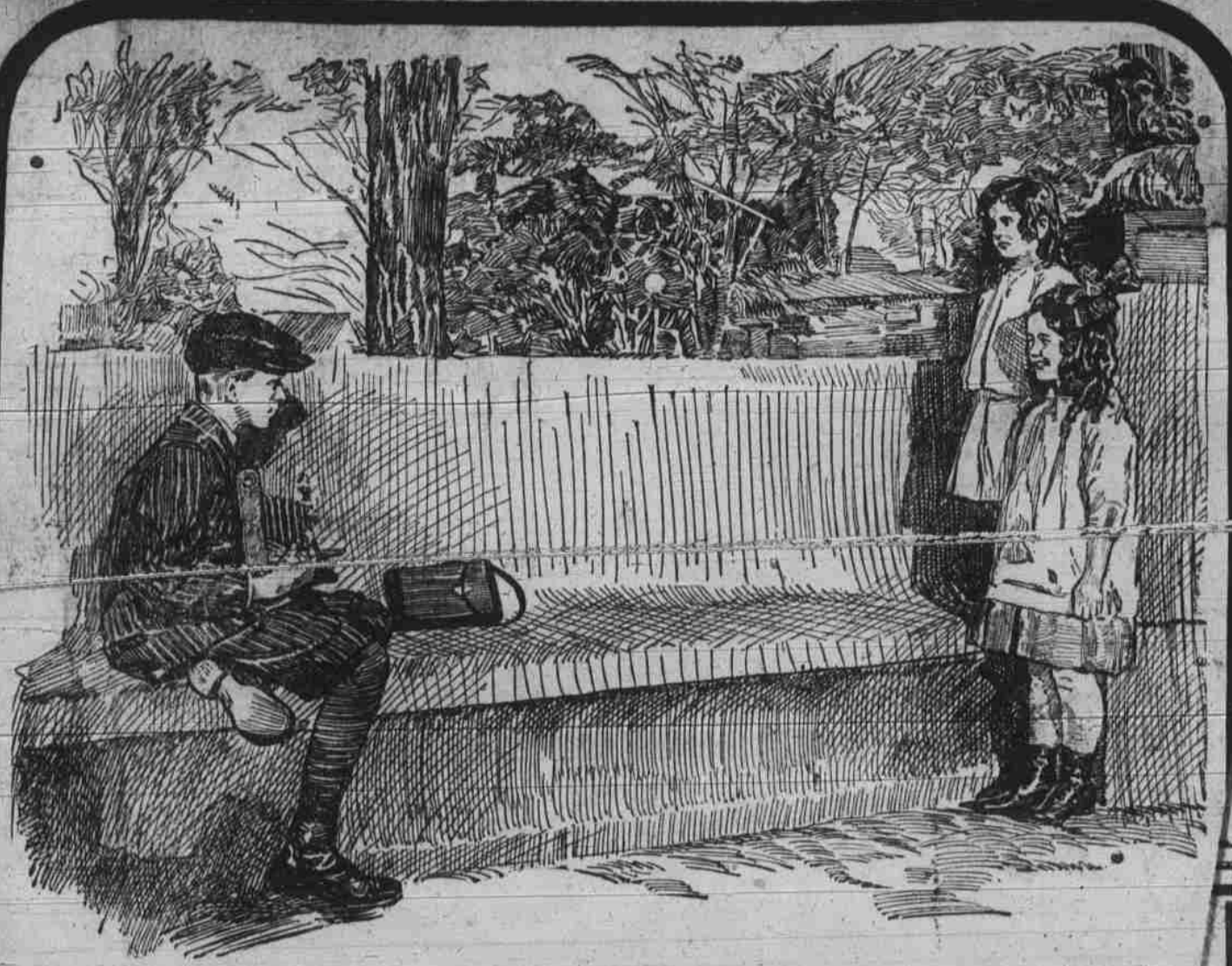
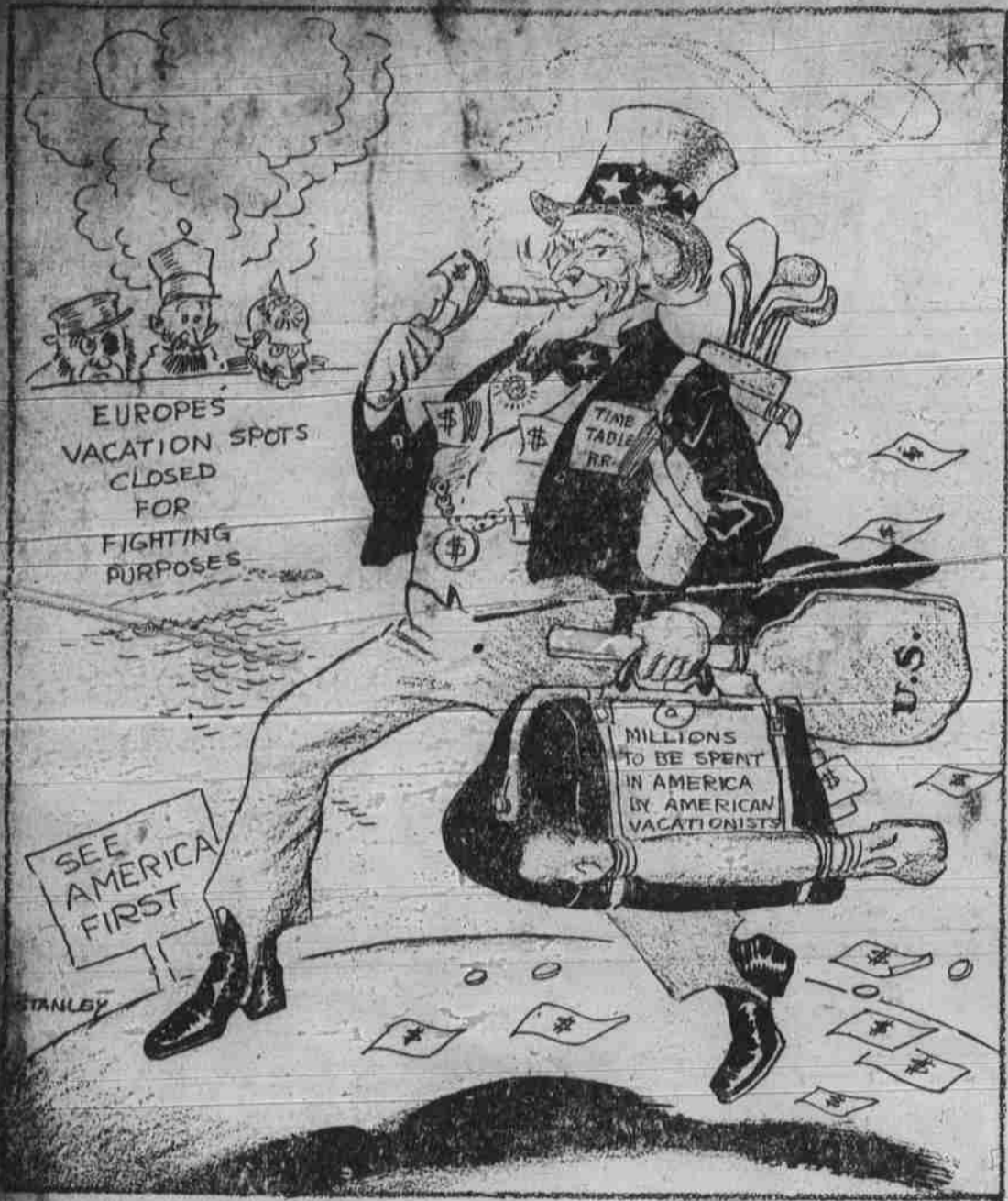

BREMEN IS READY FOR START FOR AMERICA

Lohman, Originator of Submarine Service, Tells of Plan to Break Blockade.

Berlin, July 13.—(Via London.)—Alfred Lohmann, former president of the Bremen chamber of commerce and originator of the German submarine merchant service, told the Associated Press yesterday that the submarine liner Bremen was about to start for America with a cargo and that several sister ships are rapidly approaching completion. The number of boats of this type it is understood, will soon be sufficient to maintain a weekly trans-Atlantic service.

head, but he is not conqueror of allies. Kaiser has victory in Poland and in Belgium for the present, but where is German colony? General Smuts and General Botha have stole away his Africa possession.

Germany have begun great war for very special reasons. Chief reason was to have more colony and to have big piece of China and Germans have not made the achievement of any colony at all. How long more will Kaiser sacrifice his soldiers? Allies can find time to wait until Hun has no more insides for the fighting, but Hun must make his object or he is beaten. What is for Kaiser to do? If he make attack he will be beaten most exceedingly bad. On the other foot if Kaiser is to sit down and become defensive then what gains Kaiser?

In Japan we know Kaiser is beaten. Sensible Japanese man says, "Great war last of whole year more, perhaps one and a half a year, but no longer any last. If Hun is not beaten by that time then Kaiser will make surrender himself." That is ration thinking.

One thing of England is most unjust. The object of conscience to fight England is much too good country for them. Even Hun have scorn on English to produce such man. Object of conscience is most certainly traitor to English King and country. How much disgraceful these men are to honorable English.

The reopening of direct shipping connections between Germany and the United States occasioned great jubilation and enthusiasm among Germans, but no one is more elated than Mr. Lohmann.

"Remember," said Herr Lohmann, "that the Deutschland was entirely unarmed; she carried no torpedoes, tubes, no cannon and no weapons of offense or defense of any kind.

"So anxious was I, that the unarmed merchantman character of our boats should be established beyond doubt, I insisted that the captain of the Deutschland should not even carry the customary revolver upon leaving Bremen.

"I conceived the idea of breaking the British blockade long ago but the project first took definite shape last autumn when I succeeded in convincing the capitalists associated with me—the Deutsche bank and the Norddeutsche Lloyd—that the war presumably would last another 12 months. This was the hardest part of my task. Once this was done, the rest was easy, for our figures showed that the boats would more than pay for themselves in a single round trip.

"A company was immediately incorporated as the 'German Ocean Navigation Company, of Bremen,' with a nominal capital. Articles were filed on November 8 and work was commenced on the first and second boats. The Deutschland was completed sometime ago and, after successful trials in the Baltic, started for America, following the usual peace route of our Bremen and Hamburg steamers."
