Washington, July 14.—An advisory report on the status of the German merchant submarine Deutschland submitted to Acting Secretary Polk today by the government neutrality board is understood to have declared that the ship is a peaceful merchant craft and entitled to privileges as such.

The railroad special agent was shot at Pleasant Hill, N. C., early Thursday morning by the three negroes whom he attempted to put under arrest while they were beating a ride on a packet train, which, it is believed, was their purpose to have robbed.

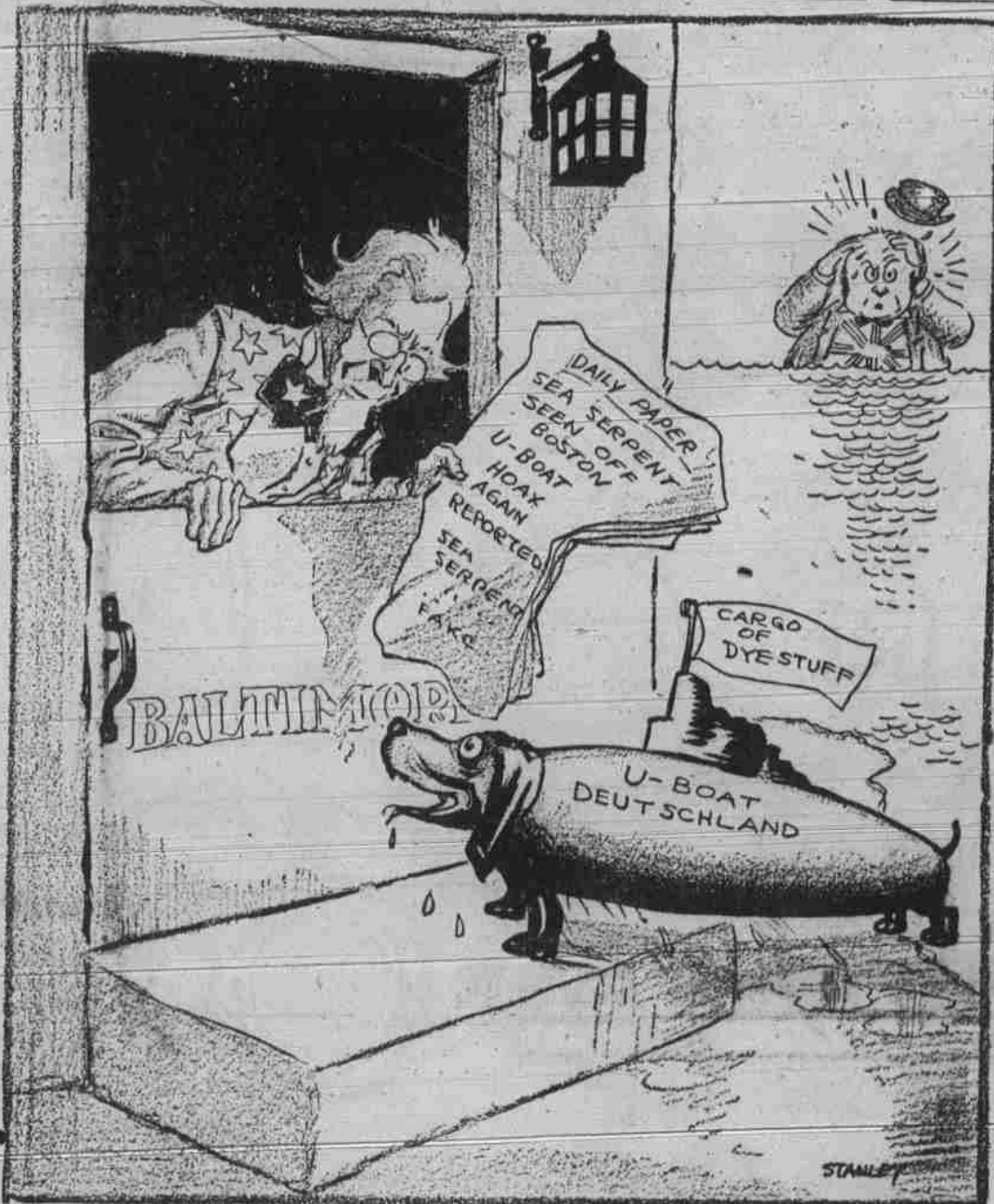
### STORM WARNINGS ON THE COAST.

Little Time Allowed For Central Powers To Form Line

ATTACKS PUZZLING

The British Instead of Pressing On Towards Combes Change Angle of Attack and Move on Cantalmassion.

By the Associated Press. London, July 14.—At daylight this morning the British resumed their offensive north of the Somme attacked the German second defenses and, according to the British report, penetrated them on a front of 10 miles. While it is expected the British would not allow any great length of time before commencing their operations, it was hardly believed the German second line would be attacked after only one day of artillery preparation. For it was only the day before yesterday that the British made an advance all along the line from Hardecourt to Ovillers. The direction of the attack also was something of a surprise instead of pushing on toward Combes the British commander chose to attack the flank of the Germans who faced Contalmaison and Ovillers and those who were occupying Pozieres.

### CABINET DISCUSS SHARK ATTACKS

Coast Guard Is Ordered to Do What It Can to Stalk Them

PLAN CLEAR WATERS

There Is An Order Issued Following Cabinet Meeting Today Instructing Aid of Coast Guard In the Work.

Later Secretary McAdoo announced that the coast guard would be ordered to do what it could toward clearing the coast of the dangerous fish and preventing further loss of life.

### FATAL DISEASE CONTINUES RAVAGES

Hundred and Sixty two New Deaths

DISEASE NOT STOPPED

There Is Apparently Cessation of the Ravages of the Epidemic In New York According to Health Board Report.

(By Associated Press.) New York, July 14.—A marked increase in both the number of new cases and death in the infantile paralysis epidemic during the last 24 hours was shown today in the report of the health department. In the 24 hours which ended at 10 o'clock today 162 new cases were reported while 31 children died from the disease in the city.

### THE BIRTH CONTROL WOMEN SPEAK IN ST. PAUL

St. Paul, Minn., July 14.—Without the police interference that has marked meetings of birth control advocates in other cities, Mrs. Robert Liggitt of Duluth, today lectured here on birth control, before several hundred Minnesota women and girls.

### HOUSE COMPLETES ITS BILLS OF LEGISLATURE

Washington, July 14.—Democratic Leader Kitchin reported to President Wilson today that with the passage of corrupt practices bill the house will have completed the legislature which he had requested. He asked if any additional legislation was desired and Mr. Wilson replied that he was satisfied with the work done by the house and thanked the house leader.

### BOAT TO AID OF THE HECTOR

Charleston, S. C., July 14.—The naval collier Hector, said to be bound for San Domingo carrying 60 marines is reported sinking about 60 miles off Charleston. The lighthouse tender, Congress went at 10 o'clock this morning to the assistance of the Hector but was unable to broom the heavy seas and returned. The tug Vigilance, which had been in wireless communication with the Hector reported at 12:30 that a steamer was standing by but it was not known whether she had transferred the marines and crew. Wireless communication is bad.
