
RAIN INTERRUPTS BUT CHAMPS WIN

BAKED BEANS FOR TWENTY YEARS TELLS HOW

Cleveland, July 24.—Baked beans may be Boston's forte but Pat Finnegan, cook on the naval training ship Dorothea stationed here, knows a thing or two about that delicacy. He's been baking them for twenty years—for 17 years he was cook on a U. S. battleship, and he's prepared 124,000 gallons of baked beans.

Here's his recipe for beans: "Begin with the best navy beans; cook 'em one hour in cold water; then boil two hours slowly; put salt pork in while boiling; bake three hours in a slow oven, with plenty of molasses and a pinch of mustard. A whole onion adds a tasty flavor."

VIRGINIA LEAGUE CONTINUE WITH FIVE CLUBS

Norfolk, July 24.—From now until the close of the season, September 9, the Virginia League will proceed with only five clubs instead of the orthodox six. This decision was reached at a meeting of the league directors yesterday morning when they decided it would be a losing proposition for the league to carry the Hopewell club or place it elsewhere. The club was disbanded yesterday and the players given their release.

Beginning today, first one and then another of the six clubs of the league will be idle all the time as far as the league contests are concerned, for when ever a club is scheduled to play Hopewell it will lay off or play exhibition games with semi-professional clubs.

The \$1,000 forfeit put up by the Hopewell club will be retained by the league as the presidents of the five surviving clubs have filed claims on it to reimburse them for the game guarantees coming to them under the original schedule. This will leave the Hopewell players unpaid for the time between July 4 and yesterday. The only address open to them is to proceed against the Hopewell club in the courts.

In deciding to proceed on a five club basis the league directors found it would cost them less than to carry the sixth club. The franchise will be retained with the hope of placing it for next season.

Under this plan Norfolk, Portsmouth and Newport News will each have nine idle days, Rocky Mount nine, including Labor Day, and Petersburg only six. Two of the lay-offs for the Tars will come on Saturdays, August 5 and 19, when the Bombs were scheduled to play at League Park. The Truellers will have only one idle Saturday at home, August 12, but another on September 2, when they were billed to play in the Powder City.

Poor attendance at the games in Hopewell was responsible for the non-issuing of their franchise. The salaries of the players for July have not as yet been paid and they will not be paid until the end of the season. The president over by the league, and L. T. acted as

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
